YOUTH CENTER

First of its kind in Stockton, the Youth Center opened last March to all students between the ages of thirteen and nineteen, men in uniform excluded. Located on 320 E. Channel, the Center has become one of the favorite spots of entertainment after school and also in the evening. On school nights it is open from 3:30 to 9:30, from 3:30 to 11:00 on Saturdays, and 3:00 to 6:00 Sundays.

Membership cards cost \$.25 for three months and entitle the holder of the card to participate in any of the following activities: ping pong, pool, games, and dancing. Soft drink stands are also provided for the convenience of everyone. Interior decorations consist of a knotty pine finish, yellow trimming, wall murals, with furniture and furnishings acquired by contributions and donations from several clubs and stores in town. Much of the work done in renovating the floor was done by students working voluntarily. In the latter part of April members of the Tri-Y Club took turns in going down to the Youth Center and working on improvements in the rest rooms, while the proceeds of the raffle sponsored by the Chinese Club were donated as part of their contribution. The latest improvement of the Center is the P. A. system added in April. Giving up time to act as hosts were Mr. W. Young, Mr. Kerr, and Mr. R. Britton.

CADETS ON BIVOUAC

Something new was inaugurated this year at Stockton High School when the Cadet Corps was formed under the supervision of Coach H. E. Evans, Captain in the National Guard. The Corps was organized with the idea of teaching the boys fundamentals of drilling, target practice, and map reading as preparation for regular army training.

The main event in the calendar of the Cadets' year was the three day bivouac held at the Lange Ranch eight miles out of town at which actual battle conditions were simulated. The Corps was organized according to regulation army form, with medical officer, signal officer, quartermaster, and engineer officer. Sleeping in tents, standing guard duty, and doing K.P. were part of the program. At the end of the bivouac, the Corps was inspected by a group of Army officers, who accorded high praise to the Corps, and to its commander, Cadet Captain, since promoted to Major, Leroy Batchelor. 
