


San Mateo, CCSF, West Contra Costa, and Santa Rosa were each, at one time or another, in first place and all had, at least once, been beaten by the local five.


Nick Romanoff battles for possession of the ball




John Reinking and Don Buchman defending their hoop




Coy opposition tries to steal the ball from Romanoff as Reinking frowns on the action





Colt Basketball

Coach Mike Garrigan left no stones unturned this season to field one of the finest Colt cage teams in SC's history. The Colt mentor welcomed only one first stringer, Paul Erickson, from last year's hardwood quintet, but using a combination of high school transfers, JV men, and last year's Bee team players, Coach Garrigan came up with a smooth functioning quintet.

The Colts began their cage victories against non-league competition. Oakdale was the first game for SC, followed by successive wins over St. Mary's, Oakdale again, Jackson, Oroville, Shasta, and again with St. Mary's. McClatchy, Grant and Turlock fell before the Colts in the league openers.

Modesto proved to be the only dark spot on the Colt record, as the Colts were tripped up in Modesto. Then the Colts broke Lodi's spell over SC cage teams by downing them easily in the first game and again in a return contest at the end of the season.


Sacramento, Woodland, Turlock, and Modesto were knocked off in that order to cinch the Sac-Joaquin league title for the SC squad with nine wins against one loss.

In the Acker Tournament, the SC scoring machine slackened under the tournament pressure and they found themselves holding the number four spot in the final standings.










Erickson jumps as Waring and Sanguinetti watch






