Richard Bordisso

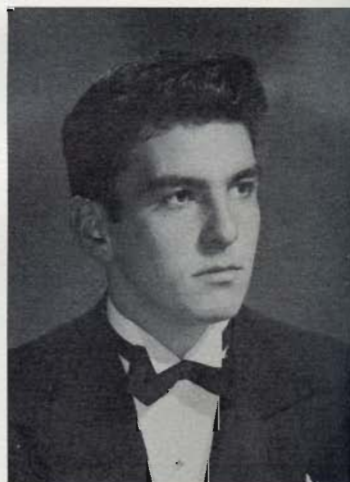

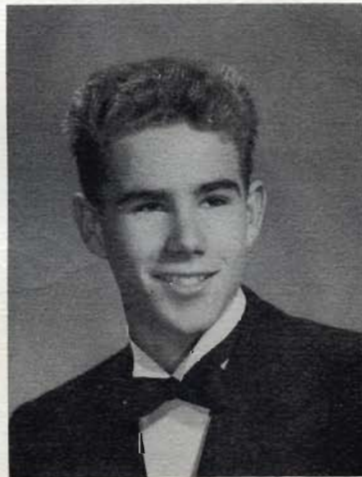
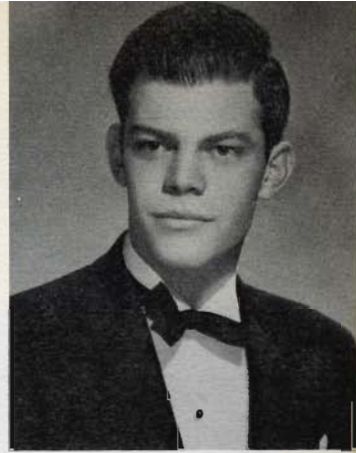
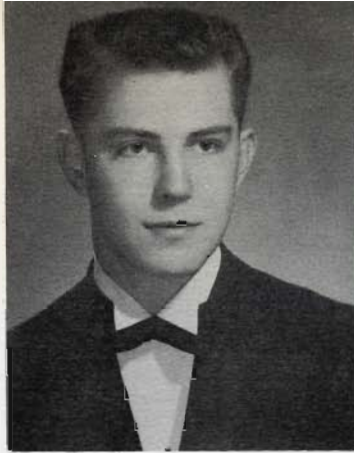
Anthony Carolo

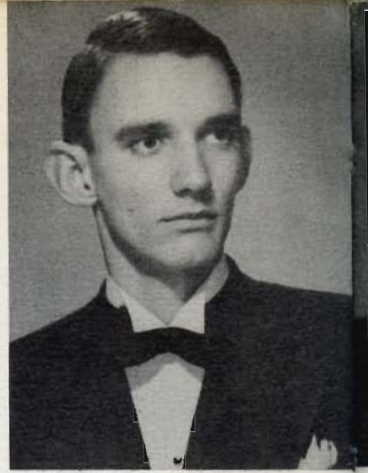


Wayne Crawford

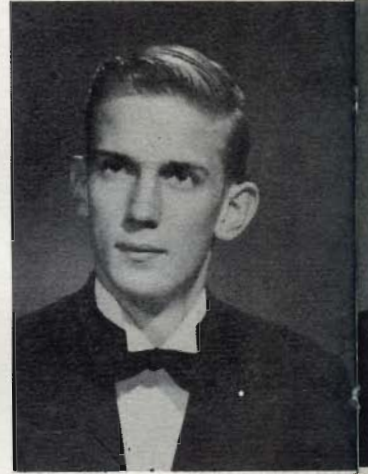


Franklin Davis

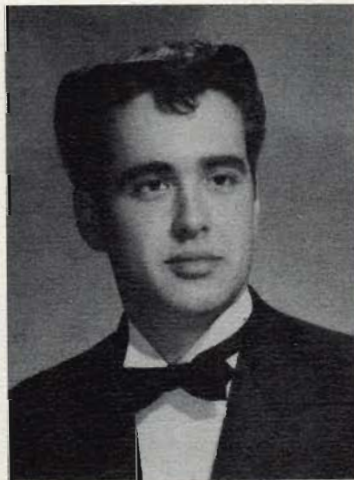
Kenneth Di Bartolo

John Facino

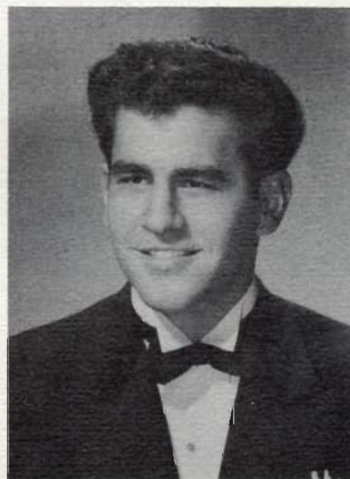

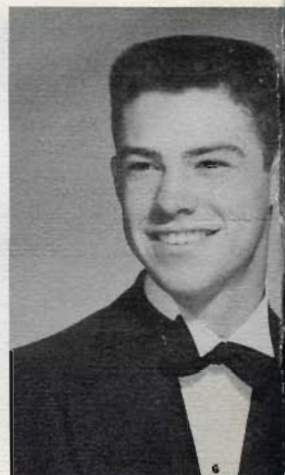
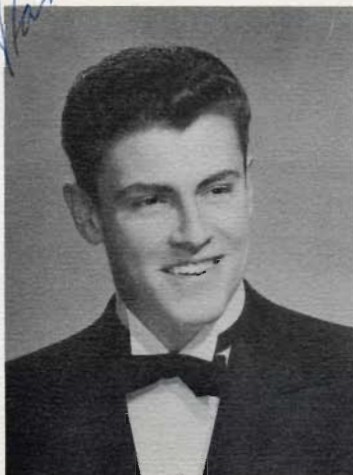
John Hall

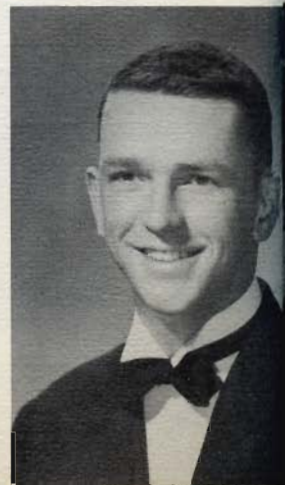
Kenneth Harris

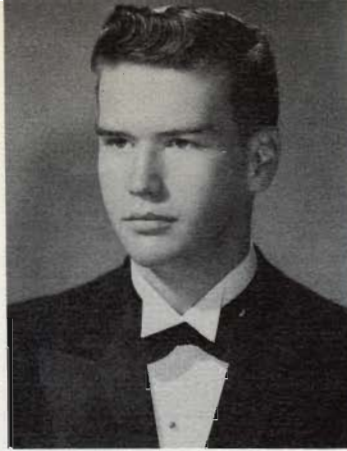


David Higgins

James McCoy

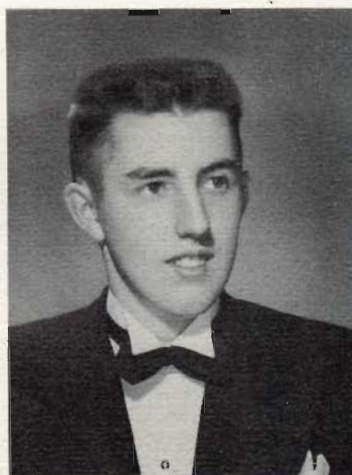

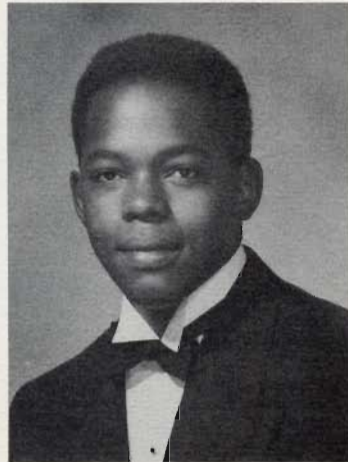
Francis Mulderrig

Russell Parker

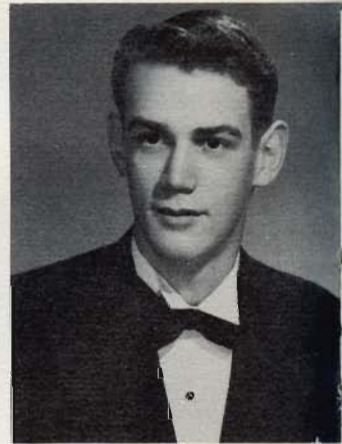

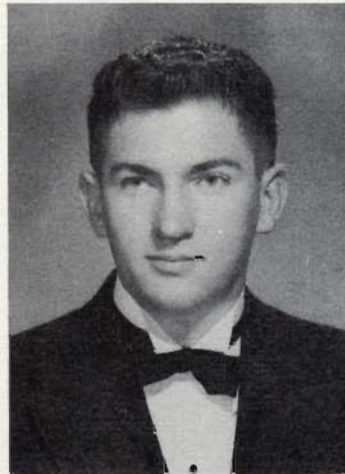

Jack Whalen

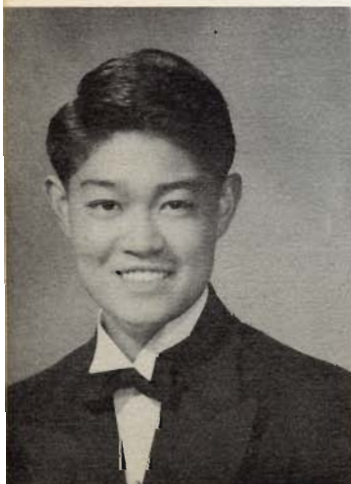


Patrick Willard

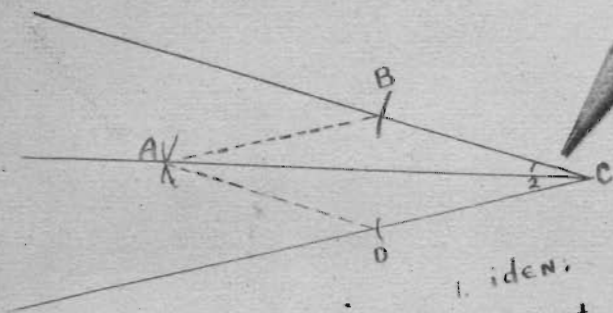


Thomas Yamada

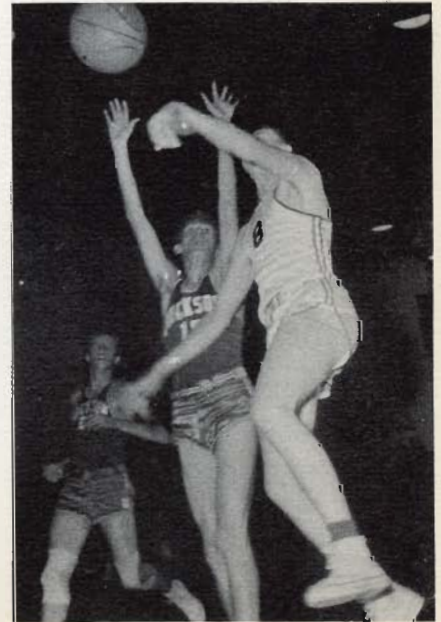
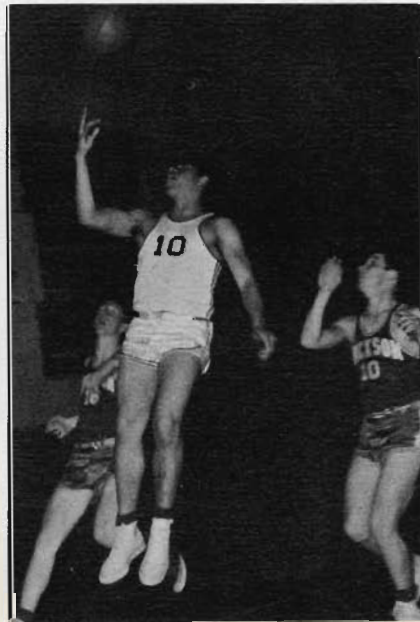
After a late start due to the delay of the McClatchy football game, the Gaels opened in the CBS gym on December 8 by losing to Roseville.
