# MR. VOLLBRECHT RETIRES

This year Jefferson will be losing one of its most learned and valuable teachers, Mr. J.D. Vollbrecht. Mr. Vollbrecht received his bachelor's degree in science at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. He received his Master of Arts at Cincinnati University under a Charles P. Taft fellowship and took work toward a Ph. D. at Columbia University in New York. Mr. Vollbrecht left Columbia University to teach at Menlo College in Menlo Park and has also done post-graduate work at Stanford.

Mr. Vollbrecht came to teach at Jeff in 1935 during the depression. At that time school started in August instead of September as it does now. In his first years at Jeff he taught two classes of beginning German and five classes of English which he "hated".

In 1942 he was drafted and left Jeff to serve in the armed forces. He came back in the second semester of 1946 and began teaching his famed class of biology.

Mr. Vollbrecht also helped Jefferson get its gym. When he came to Jeff there was no gym. He says he can remember going out at night and ringing door bells to encourage people to vote for Jefferson's new gym.

Mr. Vollbrecht is retiring earlier than any other teacher has in the past from Jefferson.

Upon retiring he plans to take a six months rest. He says it will take him at least this long to get used to not having his tight schedule he's lived by for twenty-nine years.

He plans to go around the world in steps. First he will go to Europe next spring so he will be there during apple blossom time. He says "It's very beautiful." Next he will go to England, Scotland and Ireland, then the Mediterranean where the beginning of all civilization took place. Egypt will be his next stop where he will see the land that was civilized in 4000 B.C.

Mr. Vollbrecht doesn't regret any of his twenty-nine teaching years at Jeff, and said, "I was delighted to work at Jefferson with people like myself in lovely Daly City."

The students of Jefferson would like to say we'll always remember Mr. Vollbrecht as one of the finest teachers we've ever had the pleasure to study under, and we're sure that all the people who have had the pleasure of knowing Mr. Vollbrecht not only as a teacher but as a friend will never forget him.



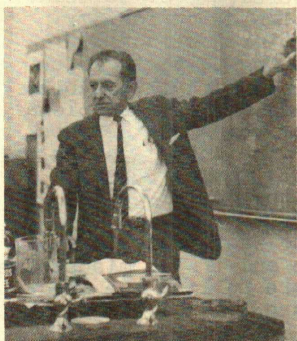
# CLASS OF '64

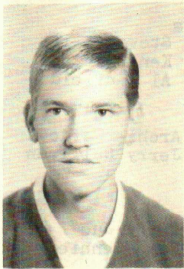

All in all, this has been a profitable year for every freshman, sophomore, junior and especially every senior. This year

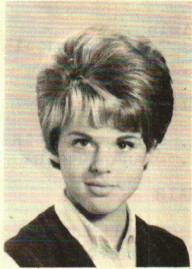


# OUTSTANDING SENIORS

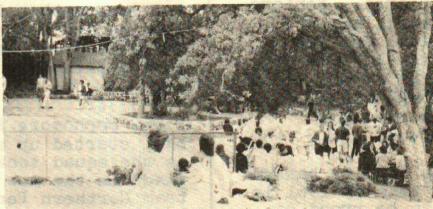
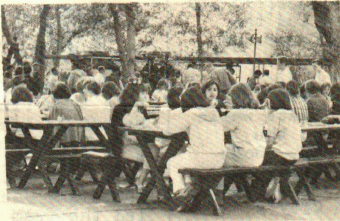
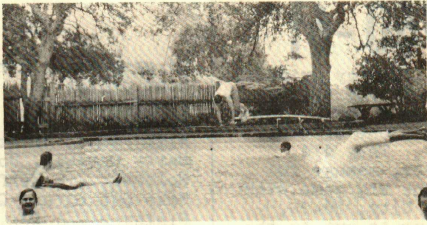

## 1960-61

The Varsity gridgers started 1961 sports on a poor note, losing all but one of their games. They did, however, manage to win the big game with South City, 26-20, pulling it out in the final seconds; Captains Bob Guerrero and John Souza led the team on offense and defense.

The 10's finished in second place while the 20's won the championship. Both teams lost only one game out of fourteen, but South City's 10's won the championship by being undefeated. Seniors Steve Willis, Al Stoller, and Bob Molossi led the 10's scoring attack. Jim Belfrage and Bill Jones were top reserves.

The Varsity basketball team of 1961 is one to be proud of. They finished in second place only dropping two games to first place Capuchino. All-League Gary Molossi for the second year in a row led the team.

The 30's did just the opposite of the Varsity as they won only two and lost twelve.

The three of the track teams, Varsity, B's, and C's, had respectable seasons as Coach Bob Watt taught his last year at Jeff. The B's and C's had many a sophomore on their teams who helped them all year long.

In swimming the defending champion C's finished in second place, but not until they broke almost every school record. The Varsity and B's did not do quite as well, but finished the season with respectable records.
