

A glance at the following record will show that their effort bore the fruits of victory.

The boys started the season right by coming from behind to beat Wasco 14 to 7. The next week they hung onto a slippery ball and pushed it across the goal to trim Shafter 26 to 7. The following Friday the Cards were stopped by a strong Exeter team 13 to 0. The L. H. S. footballers bounced back to beat the Strathmore Spartans in their next contest 24 to 20. Through the remainder of the season the Cards dumped Corcoran 14 to 0, smashed Orosi 40 to 14, but succumbed to the grinding power of Porterville 28 to 13.

Coach Bill Butterbaugh's lightweight footballers showed plenty of

speed and power in the season just completed.

In their first game, they spilled a hopeful but helpless Wasco eleven 13 to 0. In the wet and cold of the following Friday night, the Cardettes battled a surprisingly tough Shafter equal to a 0 to 0 tie. One week later, Exeter's wonder team exploded on the little redbirds and rolled out a 27 to 0 victory. The Cardettes, shaken up by their only defeat, shook Strathmore's Babe Spartans until they dropped a 31 to 0 game the succeeding Friday afternoon. Corcoran's lightweights found themselves outclassed and were finally crushed, too.

The Orosi pigskin pushers fared even worse than the Corcoran boys and became the little redbird's fourth victim 19 to 0. The annual clash with Porterville's Cubs followed the Orosi victory. The Cubs were not quite ready for the Lindsay team, for the Cardettes scored on the very first play of the game. Then they held the Porter-

ville boys to a single touchdown, Lindsay 13, Porterville 6.

BASKETBALL-A

E. E. Squire again coached the A class basketball team for L. H. S. this year. He guided his charges through the ups and downs of a 500 season. They were off to a rolling start when they slipped in an overtime victory over Woodlake, 34 to 31. The Woodlake cagers grabbed an early lead and led at halftime 18 to 12. The Cards, however, overcame that lead to post one of their own in overtime.

The Lindsay High hoopsters, in their next four engagements, did not fare quite so well. They were first dropped by a strong Corcoran aggregation, 47 to 43. Next they were clipped by the slimmest of margins in an overtime period, 38 to 37, by a well organized group from Orosi. The Exeter Monarchs added their bit to the Cardinal woes by sinking them the following Friday evening 42 to 35. Strathmore's sparkling Spartans succeeded in accomplishing almost exactly the same thing as they hung a 40 to 26 defeat on the L. H. S. hoopsters. The Cards then see red to find what they had lost earlier in the season. They pounced on the same Corcoran team which had beaten them before and gave them a 46 to 41 lacing. The Orosi cagers were next to taste defeat at the hands of the Redbirds. They were downed to the tune of 51 to 36. Woodlake's Tigers, the following week, retreated into the jungle often facing the Cardinal fury. The Lindsay hoopsters brought down the curtain on the season of '46-'47 by holding that tiger 36 to 26.

Close behind and with nearly the same amount of actual playing time were Richey, Burgin, Vasquez, Buenafe, Longacre and Mathews. All these boys earned their letters and a gold basketball.

The first game was with Woodlake and was taken by a comfortable margin of twenty points. The next game was with Exeter and after a hard four quarters Lindsay came out on top with twenty-seven points to the opponents' twenty-one. We all breathed easy again after we met and defeated Corcoran by a good margin. The final score was Lindsay, fifty-two, Corcoran eight.

Then the going got tough and the games were tight and close, but we finally came out champions, and were one of the few victorious lightweight squads in our school history. At the end of the season we looked back and saw these scores:



The Cards met a sharp Exeter team on Friday afternoon, March 14. Jerry Avina, regular hurler, pitched a fine 8 hit game. However, fate ruled against him, and the Cards went down to defeat 7 to 4.

The following week, the L. H. S. baseballers traveled to Alpaugh, who were admitted to the Sierra League for the first time. The Cards were not to be stopped that day. They scored 14 runs in the first inning, and went

on to soundly trounce the hopeless Alpaugh nine 27 to 2.

The next Friday the Cards went 11 innings to nip a smooth Corcoran team 8 to 7.


