PATHE NEWSREEL TONIGHT

PICTURES OF PROMINENT AMERICANS

Shown For One Week Beginning June 11, 1940

The news reel for this week is attracting great interest. This is the first showing of the film picturing many noted Americans. The Pathe Company went to a great deal of expense and trouble in securing these pictures of the former students of the class of '25. They are now to be found in all parts of the world, engaged in various professions. The Pathe is the first company to secure pictures of these famous people.

The first picture is of Lytle Brown, champion cornetist of Elliot Junction, taken as he boarded the steamboat on Dry Creek. This unusual scene was obtained by the daring Pathe Newsreelman, Ronald Lauchland, who braved the dangers of this out-of-the-way spot, which has long been the terror of newspaper reporters and movie men.

Elma Edwards is teaching Home Problems in U. S. C. In whose home she learned her trade we do not know.

The gentleman seen here smiling is Lowell Barnes, superintendent and part-owner of the Al. G. Barnes Circus Company. The miss beside Mr. Barnes is "Tiny" Stahl. Ernestine is traveling with the Barnes concern as the tiniest woman in America.

This is a picture taken during the late tong war in China. The lady in the foreground is Miss Grace Wynette Arthur, who has been living in China for the past five years and is the head of the "Votes For Women" movement.

This picture of Senator Emde was taken as he was descending the steps of the Senate Building, following the famous speech in defense of the Walker Bill. The lady on the Senator's right is Miss Elizabeth Walker, the authoress of the bill for the abolition of football.

The Reverend Kenneth Woolsey, of Ione, was filmed while he was preaching his great sermon on "The Evils of Football." To emphasize his points Reverend Woolsey told of the football games in which he played for Lodi High. Mr. Woolsey endorsed Senator Emde's stand.

Countess Whacknoff (Roberta Richards) is seen in front of her new beauty shoppe, "Bobbie's Delight," where she has perfected the art of masculine marcelling.

The photographer caught a glimpse of Mrs. Goldie Curry Pickering amid the crowd of Christmas shoppers on Fifth Avenue, New York City. If you look closely, you may be able to see Mr. Pickering bringing up the rear with an armful of bundles.

Mr. Bailey Fairchilds, a prominent dairyman, was caught by the camera man at the State Fair, which he attended, accompanied by his wife, Mrs. Bonnie Wilder Fairchilds.

The 1940 World's Fair, which is being held at Vienna, will claim as its most distinguished American visitors: Arthur Jauche, noted chemist, and Cyril Lowe, the Paderewski of America. They are seen boarding the steamer, "Not-so-good", at the New York pier. Mr. Lowe is easily identified by the large bouquet of the for-get-me-nots he is holding. All you can make out on the tag is the name "Irene."

Gladys Shroyer broadcasts every evening over KPO. She lulls the wee ones to sleep by her bedtime stories. The children all depend upon this lady for their nightly repose.

Myrtle Wardrobe is the big sensation of the theatrical world. She has taken New York by storm with her latest hit, "The Broken Heart."

Louise Post is Myrtle's "side kick" in the noted New York hit. She plays her parts with skill and ease attained after years of experience.
