



The Aeronautics Club



Future Farmers of America

California Chapter, Number 1

THE LOCAL chapter of the Future Farmers of America got off to a good start this year.

Lodi won third place and \$200 in premiums in Future Farmer activities at the State Fair. The farm mechanic exhibit won sweepstakes and approximately

\$90. Many awards were also received in livestock, poultry, and still exhibits.

In the first judging contest of the year held at Davis in October, 1930, a picked team from the girls' agriculture class—new this year—placed first in landscape gardening, with Edna McKindley and Ella Strother first and second respectively as individuals. The grape judging team placed first with Bruce DeVinny, Guiseppe Nepote, and Ralph Hawley placing first, second, and third as individuals. The fruit team won second place.

At the Los Angeles Livestock Show, Peter Marshall did exceedingly well with three

fat sheep, winning the Grand Champion Fat Wether in the Junior division.

In the annual-University Farm Picnic Day judging contest held at Davis in April, seven teams representing the local chapter won third place in sweepstakes and for the third consecutive year the Governor Young trophy, in competition with eighty-three high schools from all over the state. The livestock team, although placing only eighth in the contest, scored high team in horses and won the H. C. Muddox Trophy. The agronomy team placed second. The dairy products team placed seventh, and the dairy cattle and tree teams placed eleventh. The farm mechanics team placed fourth, with Howard Anderson high man in sheet metal and John Matsuhiro second in wood work.

In the state finals at San Luis Obispo on May 8 in competition with the best teams in the entire state, the agronomy team won the state championship. Guiseppe Nepote, Francis Pierce, and Irvine Mettler placed first, second, and third respectively as individuals in the contest. The livestock team placed third and the farm mechanics team placed fourth, with Howard Anderson second high man of the contest. The dairy

products, dairy cattle, and tree teams ranked fifth.

Chemistry Club

ESIDES holding regular monthly meetings, the Chemistry Club have taken several instructive trips to plants where they have seen chemical facts put into practice. One interesting plant was that of the National Fiberboard Products in Stockton. Here the chemists saw the steps in the re-manufacture of paper from the cutting up of old newspapers to the finished paper, cardboard, and cartons. Incidentally, the students decided that they would never chew paper again. At the large sugar refining plant in Crocket, California, the students were shown how sugar is refined from raw sugar and made into granulated, powdered, and brown sugar, and cubettes. They also visited the Calaveras Cement plant and the Pardee Dam and power plant.

The club sponsored a moving picture, shown in the auditorium on the American and Hawaiian sugar industry. This picture showed how sugar cane is grown in Hawaii and how it is refined in the sugar plant at Crocket, California.

Another program sponsored by the club consisted of several musical numbers and a "Mickey Mouse Comedy."

The purpose of the Chemistry Club is to further the knowledge of practical chemistry among the members. With this end in view, several talks were given by the students, moving pictures dealing with chemistry were shown, and some experiments and works of magic were demonstrated by Mr. Corell Smith, club adviser.

OR THE first time in its history Lodi High School has this year published a student-written, student-edited magazine, "The Red and White."






