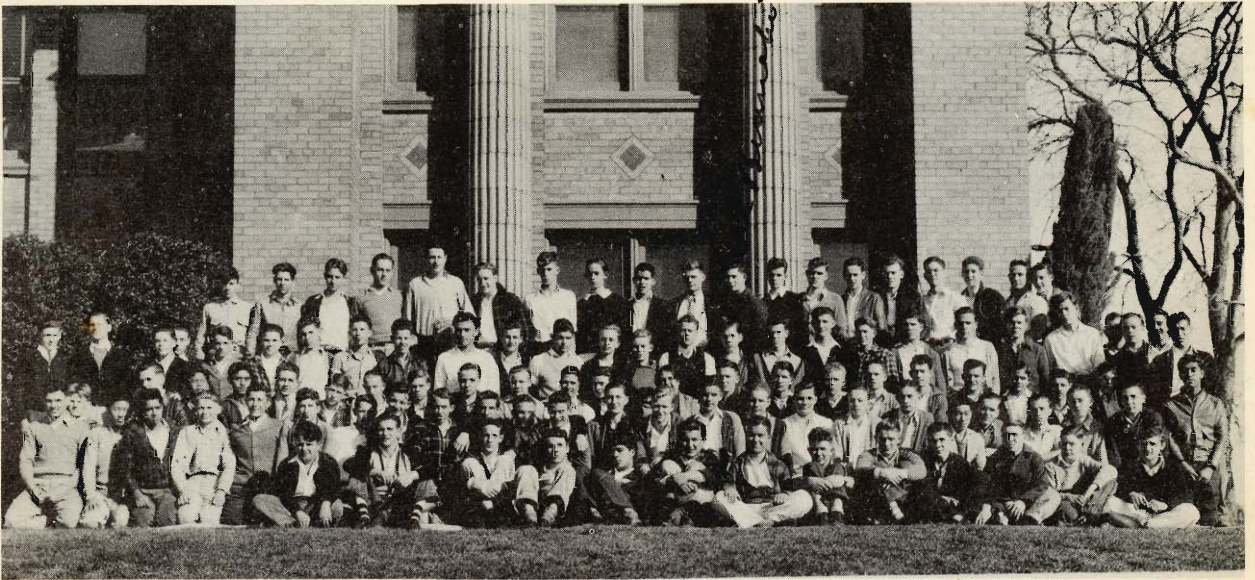
Members of this class were outstanding in football, basketball, baseball and track.
