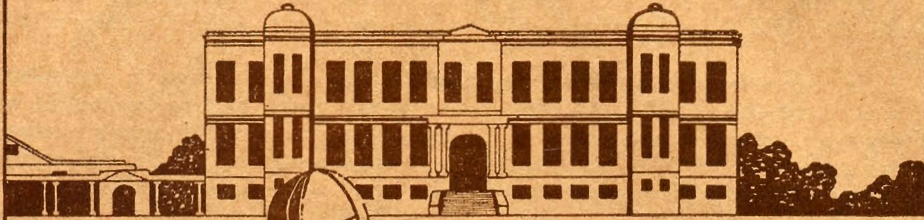

# FOOTBALL

The teams from Woodland, Sacramento and Fresno were to constitute this section of the C. I. F. Although the whole team had to be taught an entirely new game, Coach Cave was very optimistic about it and promised a winning team if he were furnished with enough material. Suits and equipment were purchased for twenty men and given to the first-team men.

Practice games were scheduled; one with Mare Island sailors was cancelled on account of quarantine. The first practice game was then played at the Preston Industrial School, where Stockton was defeated by a 42 to 21 score.

The first part of the game looked all Stockton. Preston, however, rallied and came back from behind a 21-0 score. Stockton used 18 men and was really no match for the Preston veterans. Touchdowns for Stockton were made by Monaco and Stout, with Dunne converting them. Preston's point-getters were Conley, Horn, Chaccino, and Neiblis.

The players were given a warm reception at Preston and an excellent dinner.

# BASKETBALL

## BASKETBALL

The reopening of school found the football season closed and thoughts and energies turned toward basketball. Coach Cave issued a call for volunteers, and some very promising material turned out. There were several veterans of last year's team. After a rude awakening of two defeats at the hands of Fresno, the team buckled down and won every other game.

### First Fresno Game

This first game was very well attended and was altogether a very fast, good game. Metzger on center got the jump on his opponent, but by superior passing Fresno succeeded in making the first two baskets, and then Santini managed to score. The first half ended with a 14-12 score in Fresno's favor. Santini, Monaco and Stout did the shooting for Stockton. The second half marked the weakening of Stockton's team. Monaco was replaced by Wilson during the last half. Santini was held down by Papizan, his guard, and was unable to score. The game ended with a 25-17 score.

### Stockton at Fresno

The next week Stockton made her first trip of the year to Fresno, where she was royally beaten and as royally entertained.

Almost immediately after the first toss-up Fresno took the lead and maintained it throughout the game. Many fouls were called, but none was converted by Fresno. The game was very rough as compared to the one at Stockton the week before. The first half ended with a score of 23-13 in Fresno's favor. Santini was shifted to guard and Wilson to forward in the second half, but he was soon put back again.

Wilson and Dunne did some very effective guarding in this game. Score: Fresno, 23; Stockton, 20. The line-ups were the same as in the first game.

### Woodland at Stockton

Score: 32-26.

Stockton lost her jinx in this game and showed up in something like old shape. The game was close, but not close enough to cause the home team much worry. The first basket was made by Winnie Stout soon after the opening whistle. Santini was retired for a personal foul soon after the opening of the game, and Siefert was put in. He was too light for the job, however. Wilson substituted in the second half. Lawson of Woodland was injured in the second half, but managed to stay in the game. The score: Stockton, 32; Woodland, 26.

#### Sacramento at Stockton

This game was attended by the largest and most enthusiastic crowd of the year. The famous band was out in force and helped make noise. The game was not close enough to be particularly exciting, but was very well played nevertheless. Vince Dunne and Winnie Stout were both injured in the first half, but managed to continue in the game. Wilson was put in for Stout in the second half. The first half ended with a 20-12 score for Stockton. The local team surely found itself in this game and the second half was a walkout for Stockton. Wilson showed good form for a new man, but failed to score.

The game ended with a 40 to 16 score in favor of Stockton. The teams lined up with:

#### Stockton at Woodland

This was the second defeat administered to Woodland by Stockton this year.

It was a very close game, as the score shows. Stockton took the lead, but Woodland ran the score up to 20-17 in the first half. In the second half Stockton came back in the lead, but Woodland followed close behind and ran the score up to 30 all. Santini made a field goal just before time was called. A dispute arose over the time and thirty seconds more play was allowed. Woodland succeeded in shooting a foul in that time, making the score 32-31. Santini was individual star of the game, making 22 points.

#### Lodi at Stockton

In this, the most eagerly anticipated game of the season, Stockton came out at the long end of a score, which on first sight certainly does not indicate a very close game. It was, however, a very hard fought one and no basket was made without a lot of playing being done to get it. The game was one of the roughest ones of the year, but fortunately no one was injured. Santini starred, making 13 of the 25 points. He was held down by his guard or he would have made more. The game was the best attended of the season, a number of Lodi fans coming out as well as our own. Lodi's chief weakness lay in her poor shooting. The first half ended with a 17-3 score. Lodi picked up in the second half, but not enough to win. Final score: 25 to 7. The teams lined up as follows:

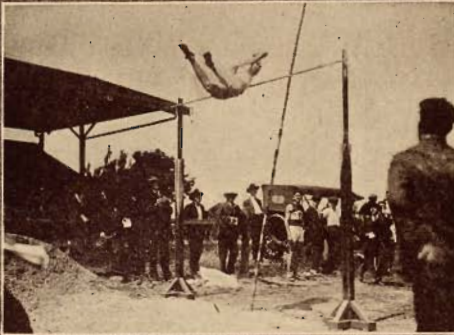
This game certainly came up to expectations, both in the winning of the game and in the hard feelings attending said game. The game was remarkable



VARSITY BASKETBALL TEAM



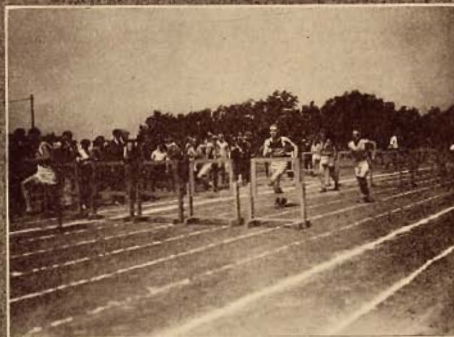
SECOND BASKETBALL TEAM

for the number of fouls, there being 22 and three knockouts. Several hundred Stockton rooters attended and rooted the Lodi rooters off their feet. The game started with a snap, Santini making a basket during the first minute of playing. He was very closely guarded by the Lodi team and was twice knocked out by very questionable methods.

Al Monaco was the star of the game, making six of the thirteen baskets. The score was 27 to 17, with the same line-ups, excepting McNamara, who filled Dunne's place as guard.

The last game, that with Sacramento, was forfeited by them, thus ending the season. We tried to get a game with Fremont high, the state champions, but failed.

The basketball season was officially closed April 24 by a dinner given to the team by the school in the cafeteria. Those present were Mr. Cave, Mr. Garrison, Mr. Ellis, Winnie Stout, Leonard Santini, Ralph Wilson, Stanley Metzger, Robert McNamara, Albert Monaco, Lawrence Seifert, Joe Arbios, Cecil Violette, Walter McGillvray, Theodore Tamba, James Cavanaugh, Raymond Stiles, Arthur Bass, and Willard Zent.

#### Second Team Basketball

While the first team won nearly every game played, the second team reversed this record by losing them. They lost to Woodland by an appalling score. The game was a mere jump and shoot affair on the part of Woodland, and the scorer got writer's cramp trying to keep up with the game. This defeat had the effect of waking them up, and their other two games, with Lodi, showed some improvement. They showed a sad lack of team work, but are all wonders at shooting baskets. They were much lighter than their opponents, which partly explains their defeat. They would have made a champion weight team. They also played a game with Livermore, where they were waltzed around to a disgraceful score by the Livermore sheepherders. The game was played on the opera house floor and was a walkout for Livermore. The second team consisted of Violette and McGillvray, forwards; Arbios, center, and Bass and Cavanaugh, guards.

McNamara and Siefert belonged to this team, but were advanced to fill vacancies on the varsity. The second team gave valuable practice to the varsity and suffered like martyrs for a noble cause.

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#### CREW

Although a comparatively new sport, the crew of Stockton high came back strong this year and made a very favorable showing in spite of the fact that track and spring football took away many promising recruits. The crew really deserves a lot of credit in view of the fact that they trained for several months with but one meet in sight.

A meeting was called at the beginning of crew season and Dick Eichenberger was elected captain and Cowley manager of the crew. Practice was immediately begun and continued until the meet at Berkeley, which was scheduled for May 24th. Stockton has won the cup for the state championship twice in succession and needs win it only once more to keep it. Needless to

say, the fellows were determined to get it. The meet was postponed until June 7th, which gave the crew more time to get in shape.

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## BOXING

A new and intensely interesting sport was added to the curriculum of the boys taking physical training when classes in scientific boxing were started early in September. Although these classes were purely voluntary, they had an enrollment of over one hundred students and but for lack of room, time and boxing gloves, it would have been over two hundred.

The course was designed and outlined for the purpose of developing agility, self-confidence, good sportsmanship and the principles of self-defense. The course consists of a series of twelve lessons so graded that all of the different phases of defense and offense are covered in the order of their relative difficulty. The lessons are first demonstrated before the class, then the lesson is rehearsed many times by the whole class in class formation. The class is then divided into pairs according to weight and experience and allowed to try out the things they have learned.

The entire enrollment to date has been over one hundred and twenty-five boys. Over one hundred have finished more than two-thirds of the course, and the results have been very satisfactory indeed. Some of the boys have developed remarkable accuracy and agility and can handle themselves remarkably well in a trying situation.

One tournament has been held with a schedule of thirteen different bouts, each bout consisting of two two-minute rounds. All matches were arranged according to weight and relative ability. The tournament was a distinct success in every way.

The course has been so popular and the students so eager and enthusiastic that the department plans to extend the course next year to include all boys who are physically fit. This will require additional equipment in the matter of boxing gloves, but it will be well worth the amount invested.

The results of the course so far have been: a development of the give and take spirit of true sportsmanship among over a hundred boys, and an added agility and physical development, a working and practical knowledge of the art of self-defense, which makes for self-confidence and healthful aggressiveness.

# TRACK

## TRACK

The track season started out with every sign of success and with a larger number of fellows out than usual. Coach Cave called for recruits about the middle of March, and within a week there was a very hopeful looking track team out. The following fellows signed up: Moran, 880; Hildreth, low hurdles, 220, 440; Palmer, mile; Hubert, sprints; Vazeille, low hurdles; Lease, high jump and pole vault; Garner, pole vault; Ghent, 220 and broad jump; Badger, broad jump; Hammnd, 880 and mile; Roberts, sprints, and De Martini, javelin.

Chauncey Lease was re-elected captain of the track team and immediately began to put in some hard work. It was decided to specialize on tennis, crew and track. He promised trips to Ripon, Preston, Modesto, Chico, Sacramento and Pasadena.

The first meet of the season was an interclass one with a cup as the prize for the winner. Much interest was shown in this, and a lot of new material brought out. Some who signed up for sprints were Ghent, Boggs, Boscoe, Hildreth, J. Moran, Todresic, Miller, Vazeille, Parker and Blossom.

Turner, Lease, Badger, Ghent and Hildreth were the stars. The seniors won the meet and cup by a comfortable score.

Stockton 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ , Ripon 58 $\frac{1}{2}$

The field events of this meet were staged at Ripon and were won by Stockton by one point. The Stockton representatives were: F. Garner, A. Garner, J. De Martini, Badger, Stamper and Parker. The races were run here, and Stockton carried off the honors again. Kenny Harry was the star of this, taking both the 50- and 100-yard in fast time. Larson of Ripon was second.

Stockton 36, Preston 77

The score tells the story of this, the first real meet, a walkout for Preston. Stockton showed off best in the 50-yard dash and in the hurdles. Except for these and the pole vault and javelin, she was hopelessly outclassed.

In the 50-yard dash Kenny Harry finished first, with Al Monaco a close second. In the 100-yard dash Harry again took first, Miller finished third in the mile and in the 880, and John Jackson second in the 880. Parker took first in the 120 high hurdles and Stout did the same in the 220. Badger with 135 feet in the javelin and Garner with 10 feet in the pole vault sum up the first place men on the Stockton team.

### C. I. F. Track Meet

In spite of the poor showing at Preston, the track men surprised themselves and the word at large by winning the Northern C. I. F. track meet by an easy 15 points.



## GIRLS' ATHLETICS



Ribbons were awarded to the first four place getters in each event and a gold medal offered to record-breakers. No records, however, were broken. The first and second place ribbons awarded to Stockton fellows were: Kenneth Harry, three first places; Fred Garner, first and second place; Bob Hammond, first place; Al Monaco, first place; Leon Rovetta, second place; Bill Parker, second place, and Chauncey Lease, second place. The scores of the other participants were: Woodland, 49½; Ripon, 31½; Sacramento, 21½; Red Bluff, 3.

This was, to say the least, an auspicious ending for the track season and the prospects for a state championship next year are encouraging.

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## TENNIS

The physical training department has made tennis one of the major sports for girls during the last three years. There are four courts adjoining the campus and about eighty girls take advantage of the opportunity to learn the game, and half that number enter the tournament every year and play for a trophy cup. Lois Raggio won the championship for 1918.

An instructor is on the courts one day a week to teach the rules and the strokes.

About the middle of March a meeting was held in the study to form a tennis club, the purpose of which was to promote a series of games and bestow a prize on the winner. The following officers were elected: Frederick Eggert, president; Eugenia Grunsky, vice-president, and Adelle Grizzell, secretary. Although quite a number of interested tennis sharks attended this meeting, the interest soon wore off and nothing more was heard of the tennis club. Many students played tennis, it is true, but no team was definitely formed and no league games were played.

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## SWIMMING

The swimming team, heretofore considered a permanent fixture of Stockton high, was eliminated this year as no time could be spared for it. Winnie Stout offered to coach a team, but no action was taken on the matter.

The girls' team fared a little better, as a team was organized and practice begun. They got no chance to compete with any other team, however.

Stockton has the advantage of a fine plunge connected directly with the shower and locker room of the gymnasium. The girls have the tank two nights a week and are taught by Miss Stella Davis, who coaches from 100 to 150 girls a year. The swimming season ends in June with a meet when the girls try for the championship, and are judged from two or three good strokes, a few drives and one speed race. The trophy cup of last year was won by Leila Dunkum.
