VARSITY TEAM

Gathered around Coach Solomon for a few last instructions are the members of the first string Tarzan varsity of 1937. This squad which so ably represented its school is composed of the following boys as pictured above, left to right: Grischott, e; Parker, t; Capps, g; Carpino, t; Leicht, tailback; Chiccone, c; Johnson, h; Judge, e; Giambastiani, h; Cope, f; Herrero, g. Practically all of these boys were on the varsity for the first time. This didn't hamper their ability, however, as they went successfully through a tough season with only one thing to anger them. They lost to Lodi. Though this loss to the "grape-squeezers" was not their only one, it was by far the bitterest. As a small token of its appreciation, the school awarded twenty-eight of the players with gold footballs.

SECOND TEAM

Composed of the boys who take the first string's bumps and bruises, the second string varsity has proven itself invaluable to the squad. Here it is pictured during a night game just before Coach Solomon sent them in to take the place of a tired first string. Their eagerness to get into the game is apparent by the expressions on their faces. 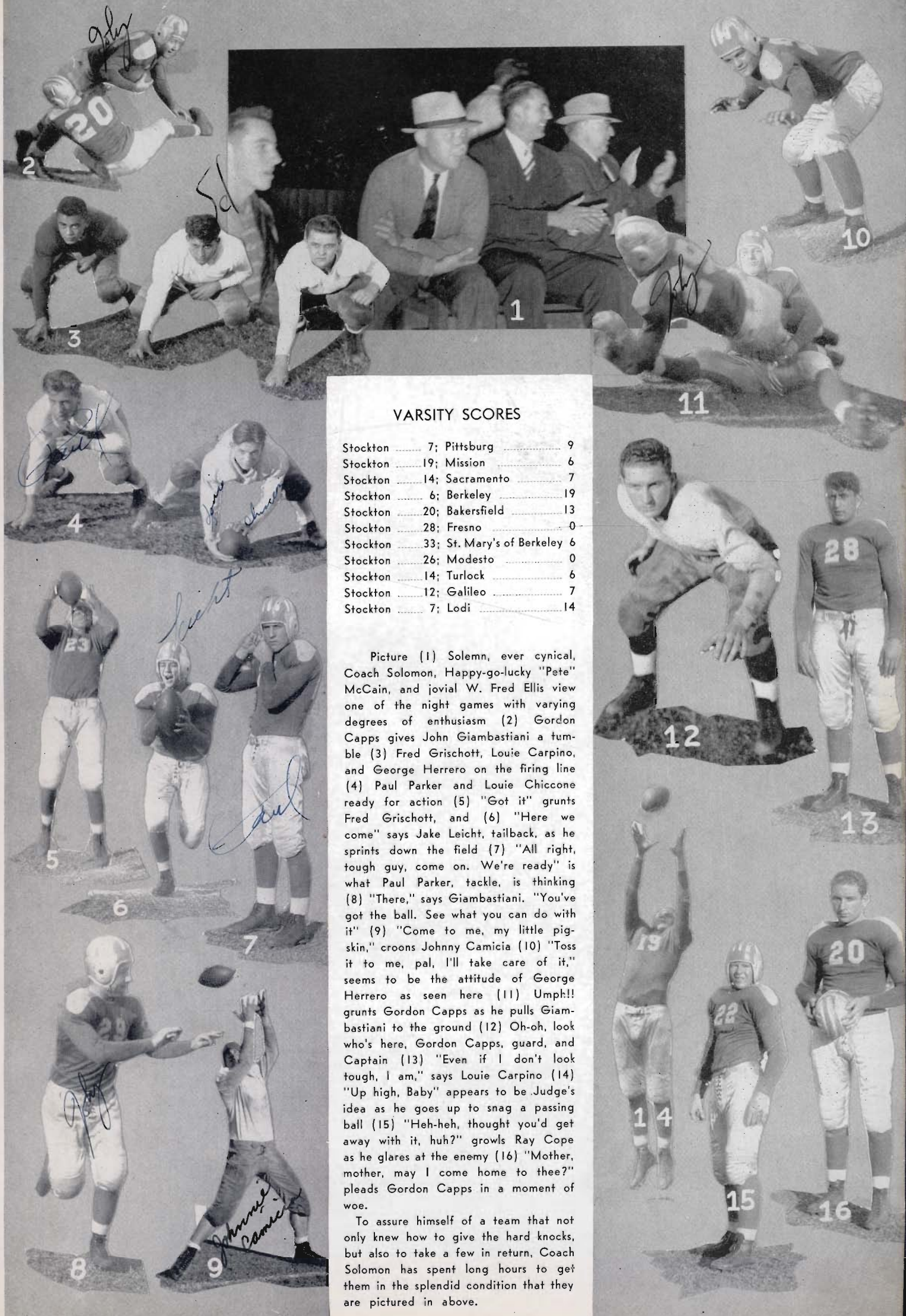

Consisting of the players of the third string varsity, this squad had a very good record for the season. Their schedule contained 6 league games and 4 practice games. Of these they won 4 league and 3 practice games. Losing to Sutter Creek and Oakdale in league competition by the scores of 12-0 in both games, the Junior Varsity completed the rest of their schedule without further losses. Included in the schedule was Lodi, which bowed to Stockton 6-0. Next year this squad will, in all probability, form the second or maybe even the first string.

Under the coaching of "Mike" Garrigan, the Stockton "B" Team played seven league and two non-league opponents. Stockton lost 0-9 to Turlock and tied Vacaville 7-7. The league games turned out well, Stockton winning 4, tying 2, and losing 1. Unlike the varsity, the B team beat Lodi 7-6. The members of this team who are not graduating will try to make the Junior Varsity next year and continue up the ladder until, finally, they might reach the varsity.
