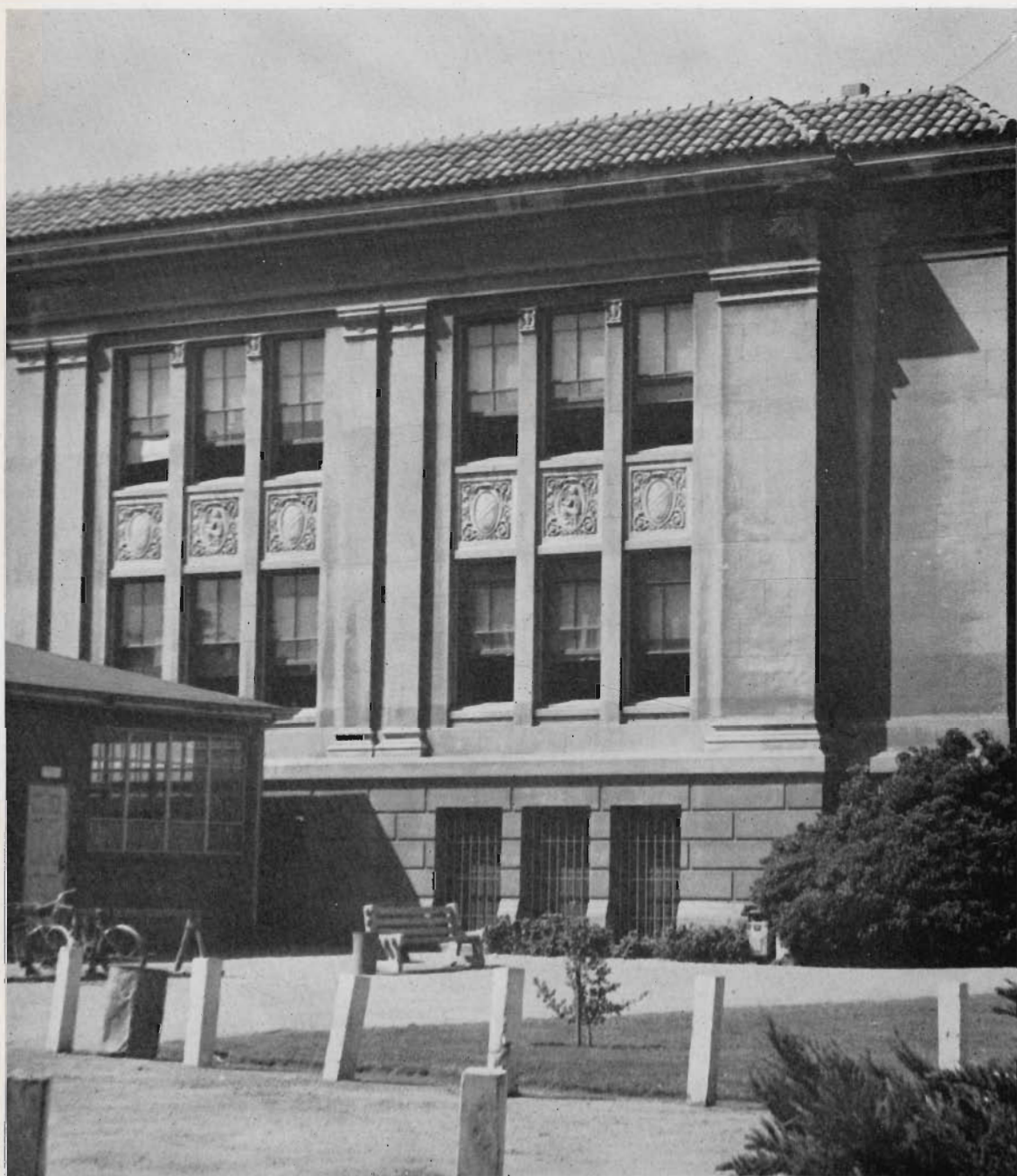

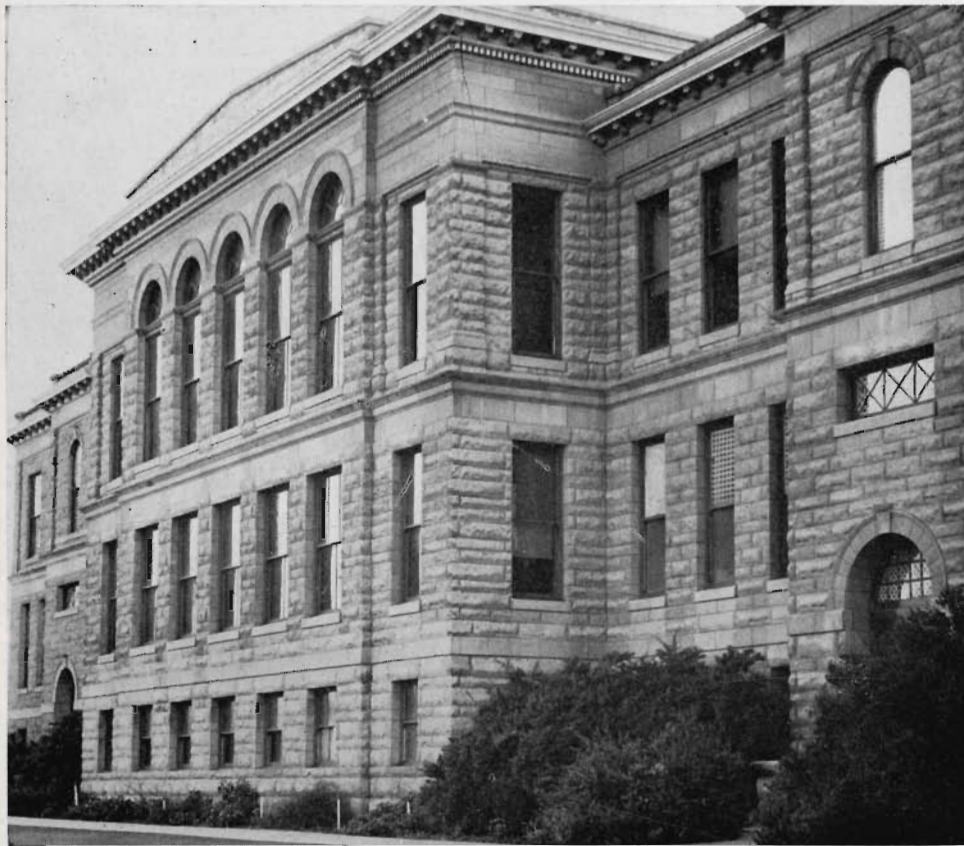

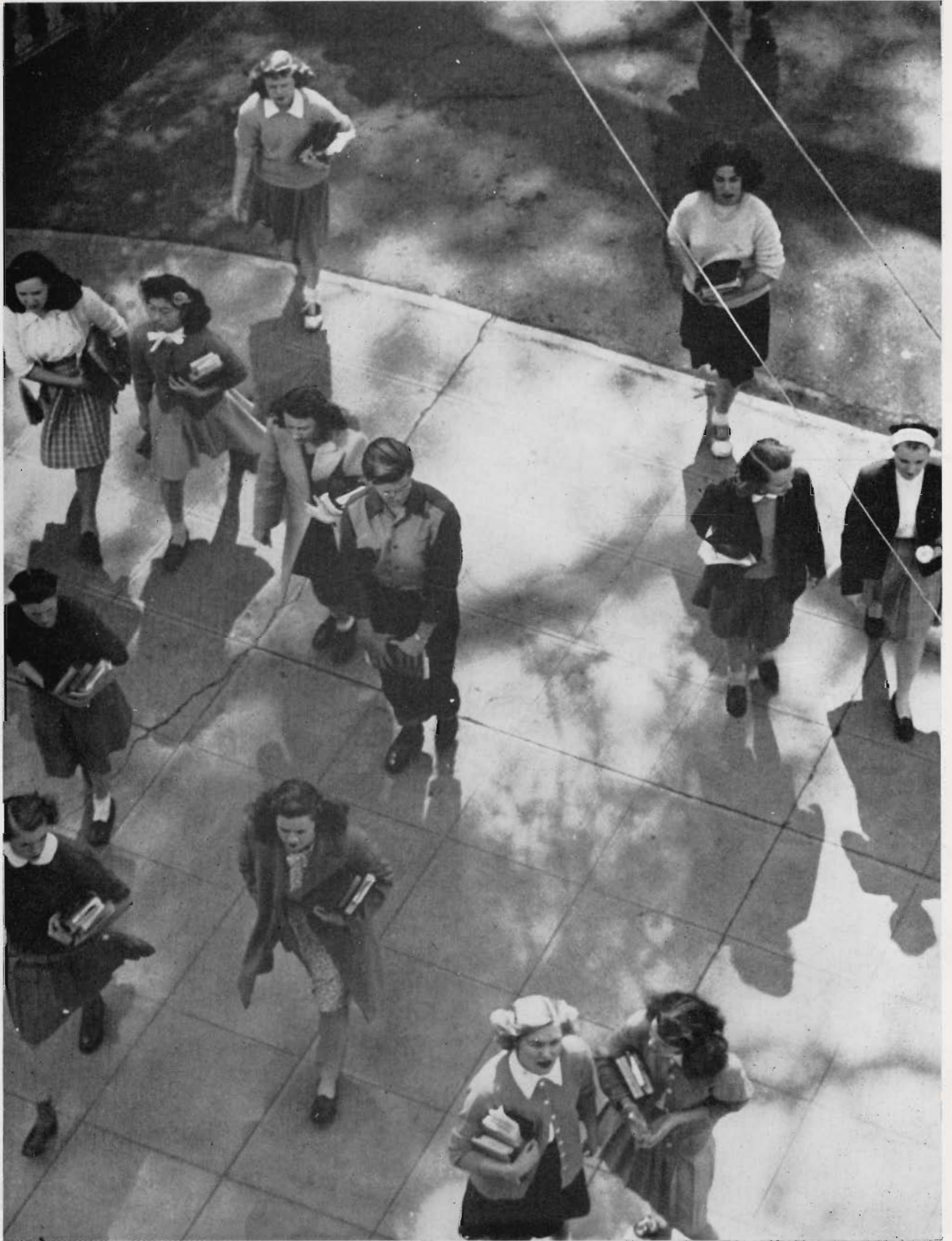

Yes, our administration is our pride and joy; we will never forget them.

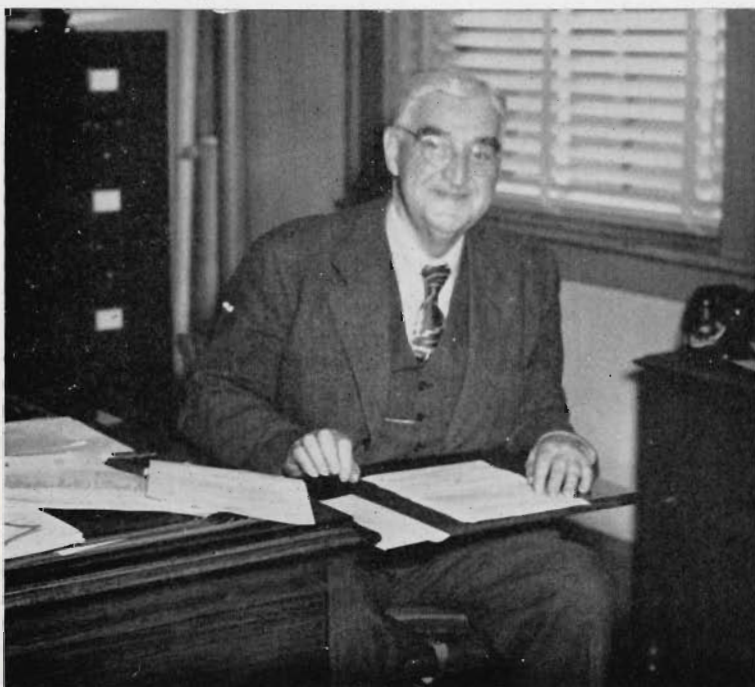

Most certainly our faculty and administration are important, but the school could not function properly without the services of the group of people who do the "special work."

Included in this category are the librarians, who serve the students faithfully; the Attendance Office, keeping "tab" on the students; the Commercial Office, handling the finances of the school; the Main Office, the secretarial part of the school; the Night School Office, in charge of night school courses; the Registrar, who performs the challenging duty of scheduling classes;

and the Matron, taking care of those in need of first aid or medical care.

Keeping the campus and buildings clean and in good condition are the duties of the gardeners and janitors. The cafeteria workers meet the task of preparing and serving the meals at the cafeteria each day.

We have tried to give a representative view of all the above groups; there are many who are not pictured but who perform equally important duties.
