The Tarzan Football Squad of 1945 tied Modesto for the title of the Sac-Joaquin League, Southern Section, in regular league play, but they were edged by the Panthers 18-12 in the final playoff game.

The varsity football team this year had a fast, tricky backfield, and a big, hard-hitting line. They ran through their early season practice games with Pittsburg and Grant without a defeat, although the Pittsburg Bucs did tie the Tarzans 13-13. In first round league play, they dumped all the other teams in the Southern Section of the league. The Turlock Bulldogs fell first, by a score of 44-0; then the Lodi Flames were defeated 22-0. The Stockton defeat of the Modesto Panthers, 14-13, ended the first round.

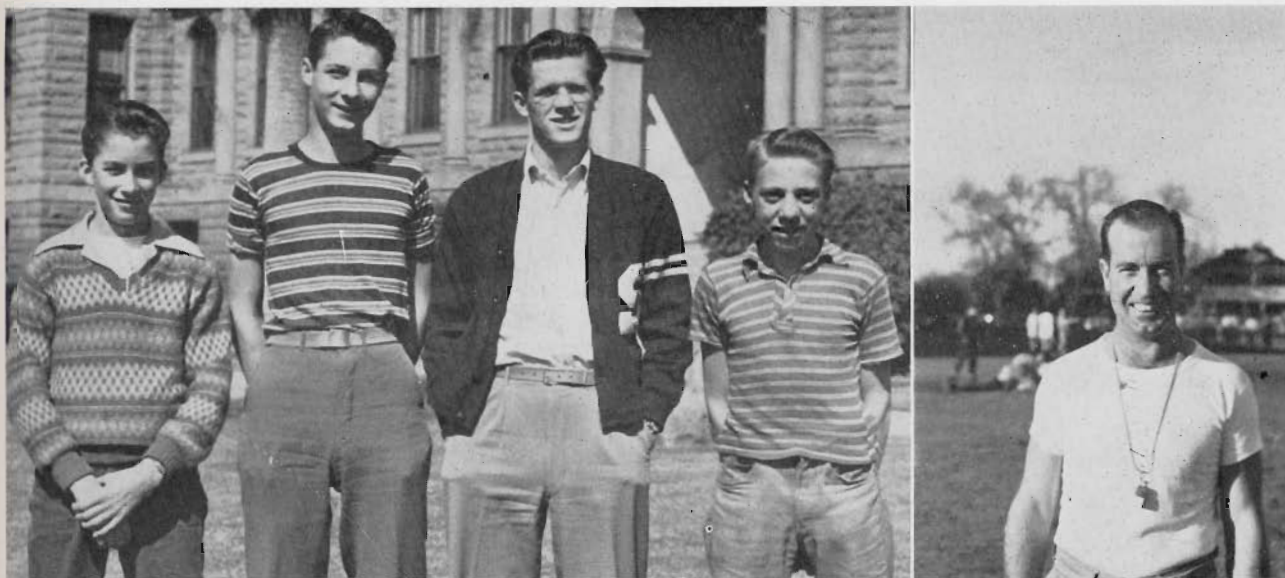
In the second round they again ran over Turlock and Lodi by scores of 20-0 and 38-0. The second Modesto game, played on the Modesto gridiron, saw the Panthers defeat the hard-fighting Tarzans 20-7. The final game for the cham-

pionship of the league was played in Baxter Stadium, but the Panthers also won this one.

Jack Heath, the starting quarterback, and reserve quarter Veto Ramirez shared the passing chores in the varsity backfield. Either Mel Schmid or Fritz Denzer and Bill McFarland filled the speedy halfback posts, while Gus Hakeem did the power plunging from the fullback position. Bob Sanguinetti sometimes took over the job of either McFarland or Hakeem. Dick Gaedtke and Don Stites handled the end positions. Ozeer Ford replaced Gaedtke when Dick broke his collarbone in the middle of the season. The guards were Scott Jenkins and Wes Parsons. The tackles were Jack Holmes and Terry Watters or Bob Stoner, while Dick O'Connor rounded out the line at the center spot.

The Tarzans had a good team this year. They were unscored upon in league play except by the Modesto Panthers. A successful year was theirs because of the effort which they put into making their team one of the best.

# INTO THE FOOTBALL SEASON



The head coach of the varsity football team this year was Mike Garrigan. He was ably assisted by line coach Garrett Arbelbide and the staff of managers, headed by Delbert King. The coaches were in the process of making a good football team each afternoon, when they could be seen putting the squad through callisthenics and practice drills. The varsity spent several hours each afternoon getting in shape for the tough season that lay ahead. After play started, practice continued as before. To coaches Garrigan and Arbelbide fell the task of putting them in shape for a successful season, a job which they did well.

The managers took care of all the equipment, at practice and at the games. Sometimes their importance to the team is overlooked, but a large amount of the success of the season is always due to the managers.

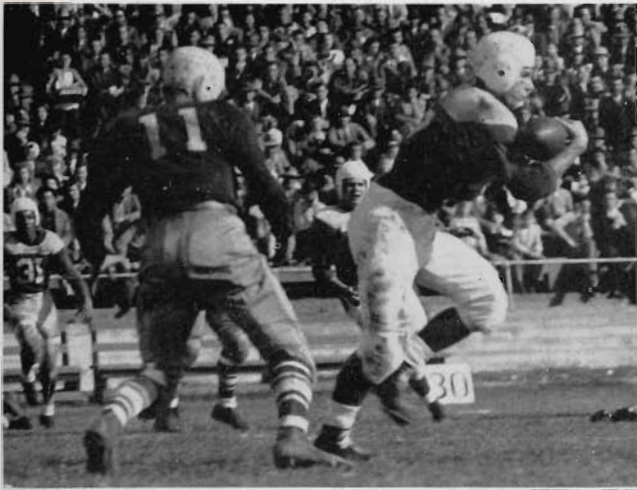


The last game on the season's schedule was the final championship contest with Modesto for the Sac-Joaquin League, Southern Section, title, which was played in Baxter Stadium on the evening of November 30. The Tarzans scored twice before the Panthers even threatened. McFarland scored the first touchdown from the one yard line. Hakeem ran the second score over from the two yard stripe. Going into the fourth quarter, the Tarzans were leading 12-0, but then Modesto exploded for three quick touchdowns. No other scores were made during the rest of the game. The final score was 18-12.

Before a crowd estimated at 12,000 spectators, the Tarzans edged the Modesto Panthers 14-13 on the night of October 26. A pass from Heath to Dick Gaedtke, who lateraled to McFarland, was good for the first touchdown. From the Modesto 35 yard line Heath passed a perfect strike to McFarland, who ran the ball over for the last Tarzan score. The Heath to McFarland combination worked for both points after touchdowns, which proved to be the winning points.



On November 22 the football squad dumped the Lodi Flames 38-0 in a second round league game. This win for the Tarzans marked the sixth straight time in the last three years that a Stockton High team had dumped their Tokay City rivals. The Tarzans made 462 yards through the air and on the ground to the Flames' 143 yards. Bob Sanguinetti and Bill McFarland each scored two touchdowns and added one conversion to the Tarzans' total. Other touchdowns were made by Mel Schmid and Jack Heath. This win gave the varsity a league record, up to that time, of five wins and no losses.

# BASKETBALL ALSO MEANT

The 1945-1946 varsity basketball squad, the unofficial state champions, undefeated in high school competition, spent many hours of practice, getting in shape for their long schedule.

They played the usual practice games against other high schools, and then started play in the City League. They were undefeated in first half play, and took the final league championship. Sac-Joaquin League play saw them take six straight victories, two each over Turlock, Modesto, and Lodi.

Then came the final game for the championship of the entire league. Woodland came to Stockton for the game. Four thousand cheering spectators filled the Civic Auditorium. Woodland took an early lead after the tipoff, but they could not hold it as several Tarzans started getting the range. The Tarzans led 17-5 at the first quarter mark, and 29-15 at halftime. The Wolves could not match the Tarzans' quick baskets during the second half, and the game ended with the score 48-33.

All of the Stockton men in uniform saw action in the game which gave them the championship of the Sac-Joaquin League. A dinner, gold bas-

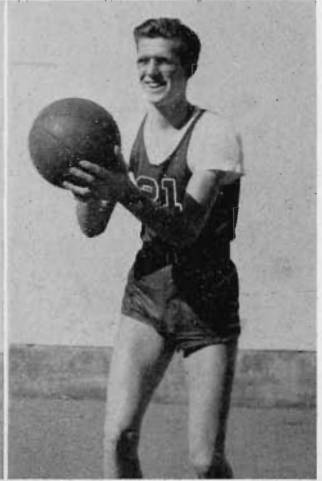
ketballs, and many awards climaxed a successful season.

The Lenzmen swept through their regular league schedule without a defeat. They dumped Modesto 49-28 and 60-27, gaining revenge for the defeats of last year. The hardest games came with Lodi. The first one was played in the Stockton High Cracker Box. Stites and McFarland combined for 28 points and the Tarzans won 43-37. The next Lodi game was played on the Flame court. Lodi took an early lead, and the score was tied four times in the first quarter. In the second quarter the Lenzmen forged ahead. The Flames never caught up with them again, and the game ended with the score 40-32. This game gave the Tarzans the southern half title of the Sac-Joaquin League.

Long weeks of practice, days of planning—"break behind that man," "hurry back on defense," "get down court fast on offense"—it all paid off well.

The high point man for the entire season was Don Stites, the Tarzans' big forward, who was named to the All-Conference Team. Runner-up was Rod Detrick, high jumping center, who made the second All-Conference Team. Stites scored 179 points and Detrick made 165 digits.

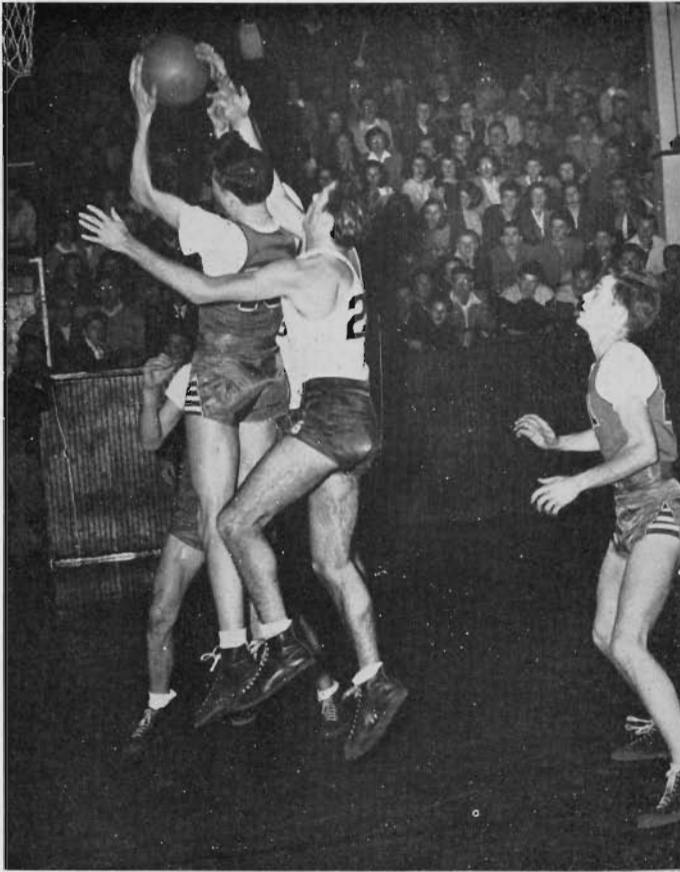

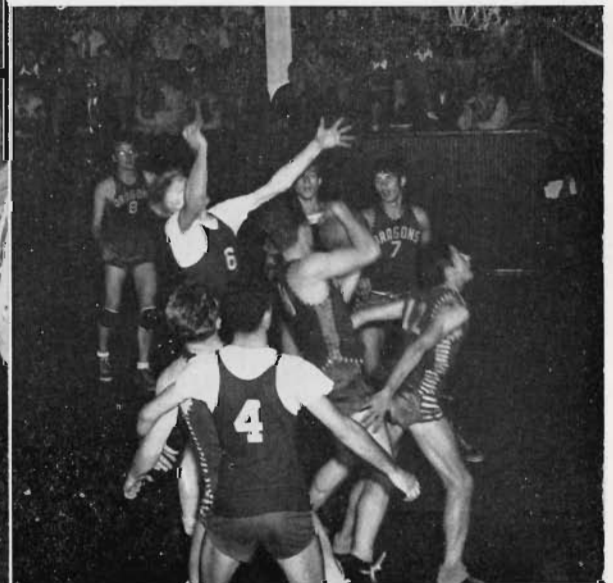

The Bees dumped the Lodi, Turlock, and Linden lightweights twice each, and Grant, Tracy, and Modesto once each.

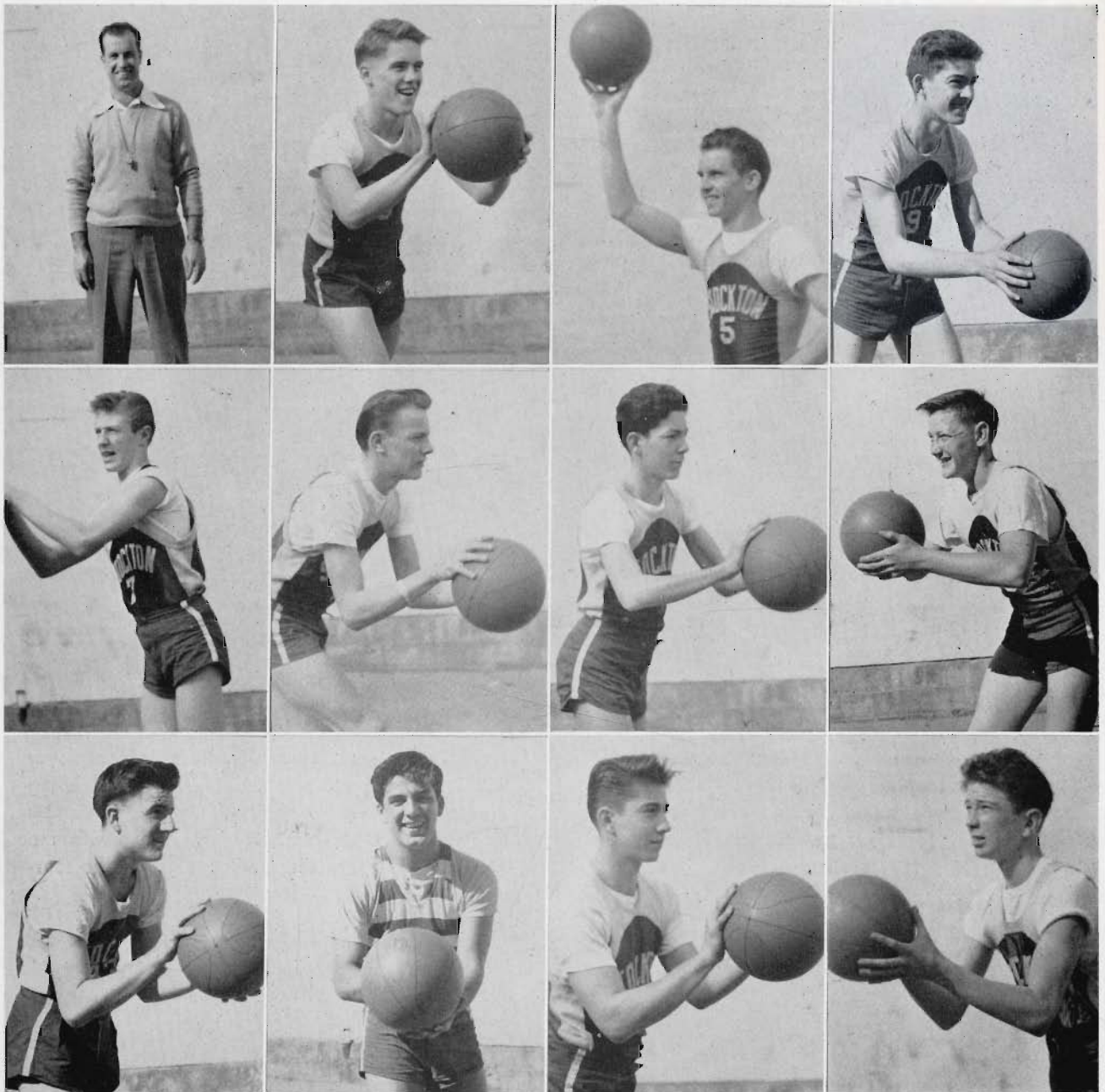

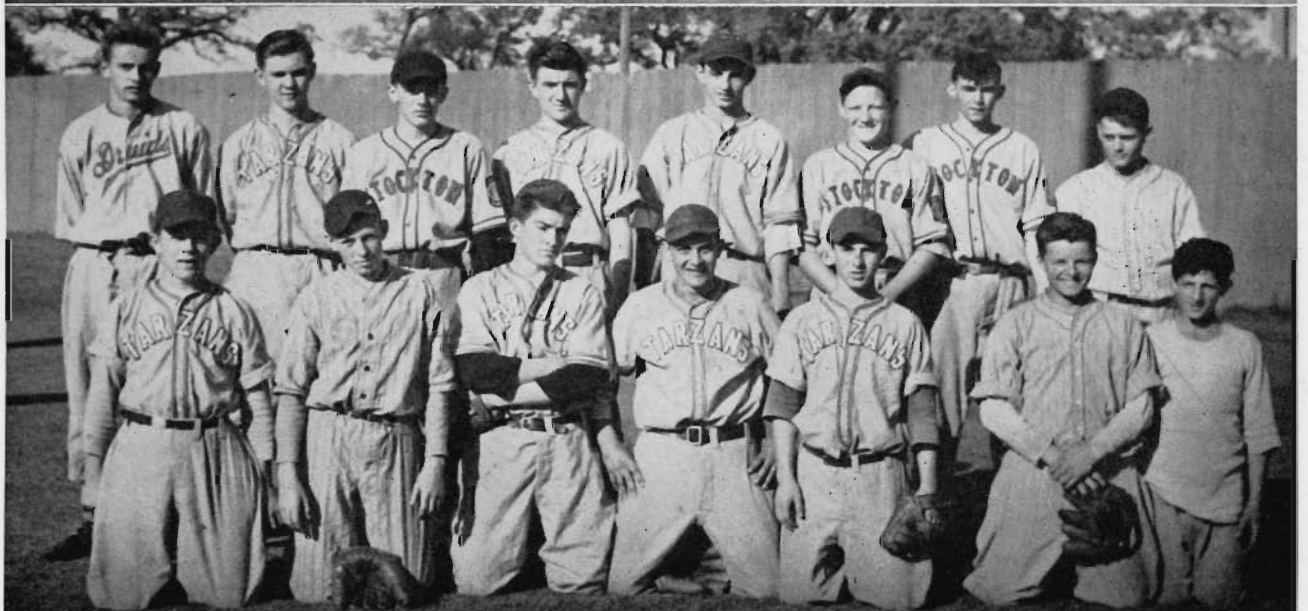
# BASEBALL HAD A WINNING TEAM, TOO

During the war the track team operated on a curtailed schedule, but is now on the way back to the normal number of meets.

All competition with other schools this year had to be held away from the Tarzan oval, as it is not considered in good enough condition to conduct meets.

In their first dual meet of the season, the Tar-

zan thinclads ran over the Turlock Bulldogs by a score of 71-33. Dick Gaedtke took highpoint honors by placing first in the 220 yard dash, first in the shot put, and running the first lap on the winning relay team. First places were taken by Gaedtke, Kinser in the 100-yard dash, Garmire in the 880 yard run, Alvarez in the mile run, Lamberty in the high jump, and Okamura in the broad jump.

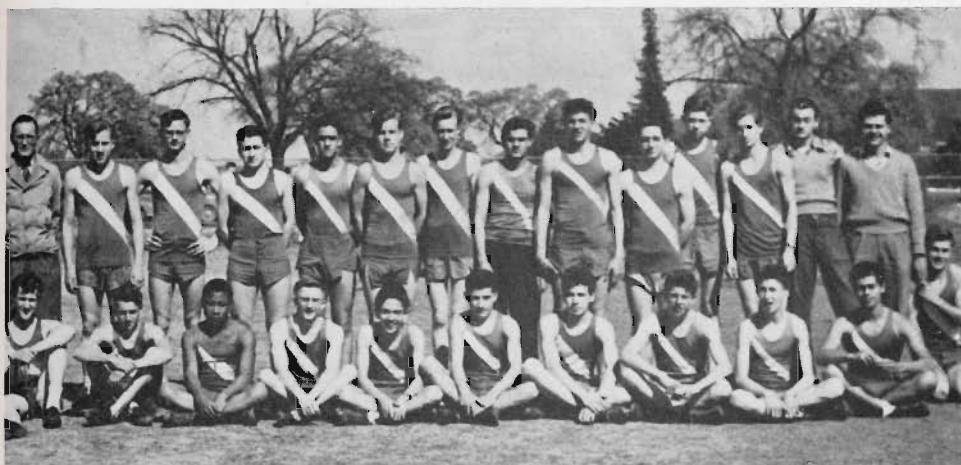
The Stockton relay team is one of the best that has represented Stockton High in the last few years. It is composed of Gaedtke, Denzer, Kinser, and Schmid.

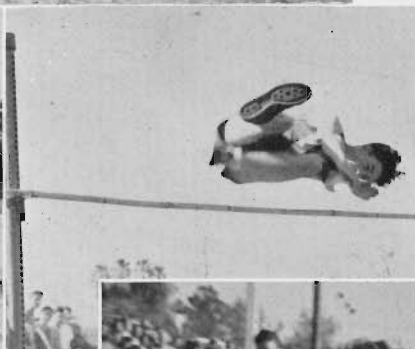

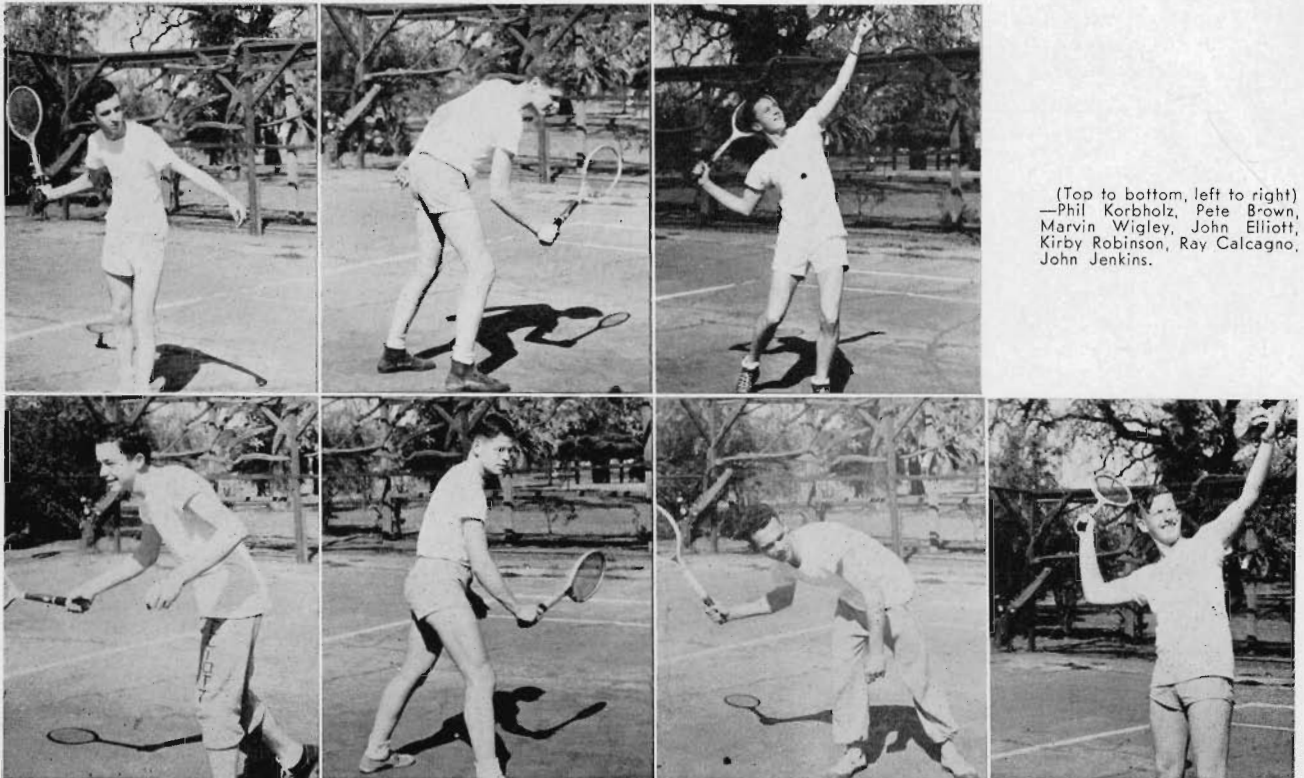

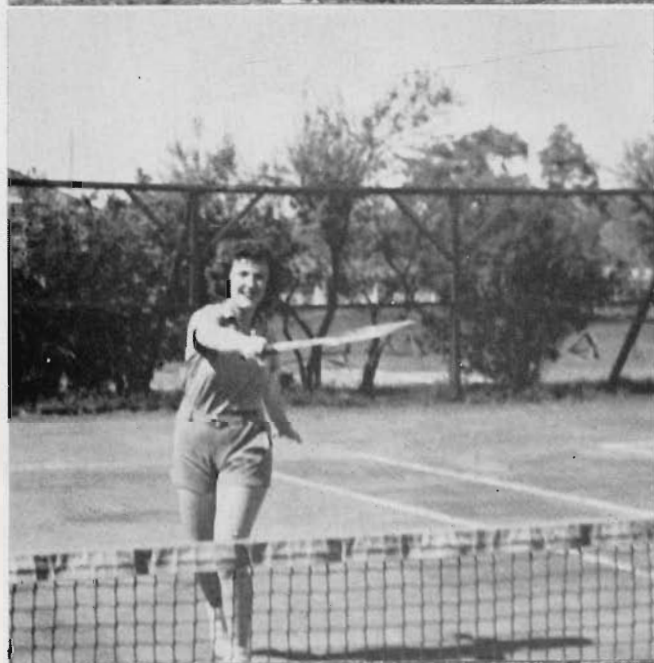
So far the golf team has had two meets with the Modesto Panthers, and although they lost both meets, they did better in the second meet than they did in the first.

vidual skill is required in these games, the girls gain coordination, more than they do in team games.

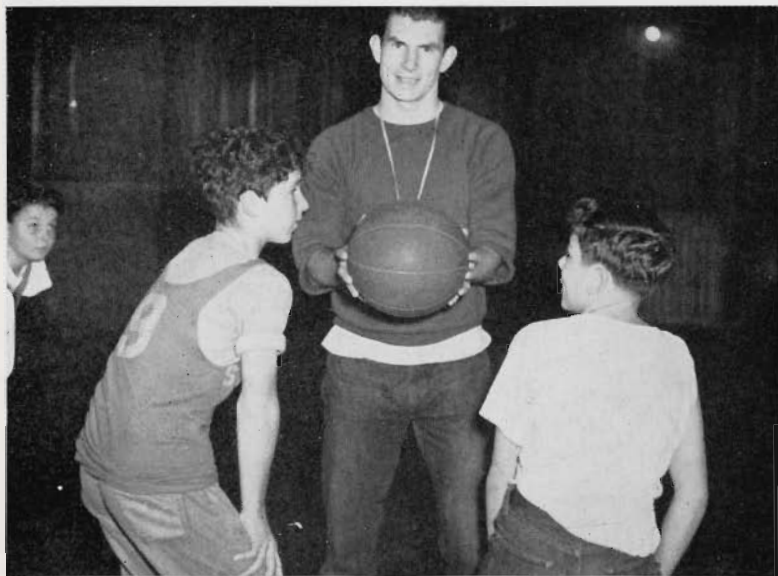
