Unlimited Basketball Team



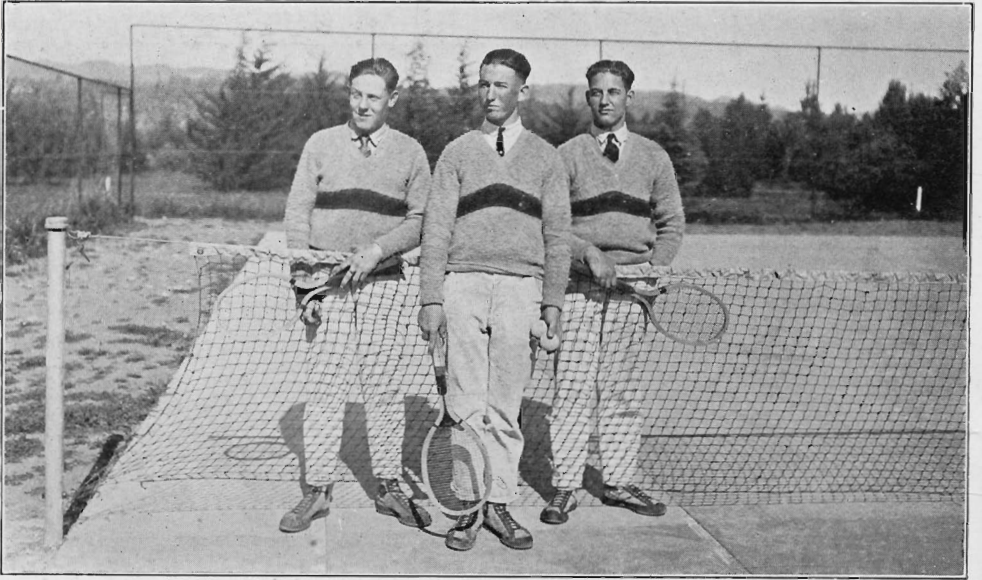

NAPANEE—Napa High School.

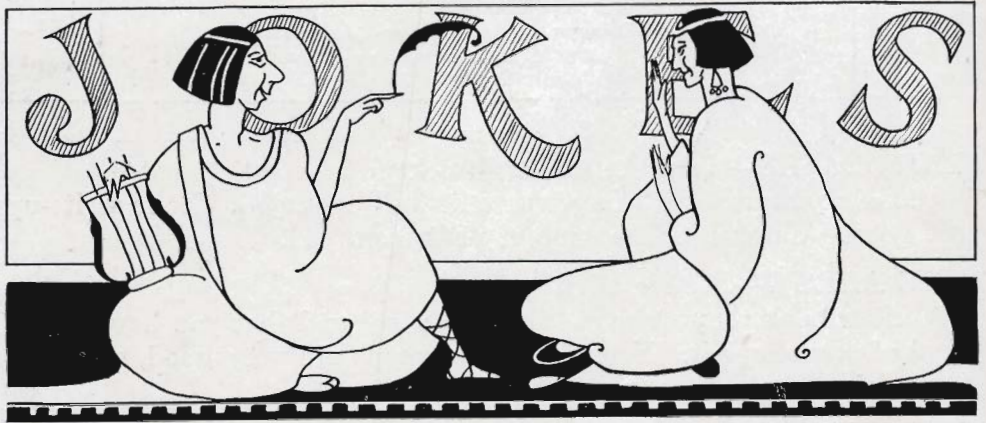
Your book is one of our best exchanges. Your stories and poems are good. Your Alumni write-up is well written.

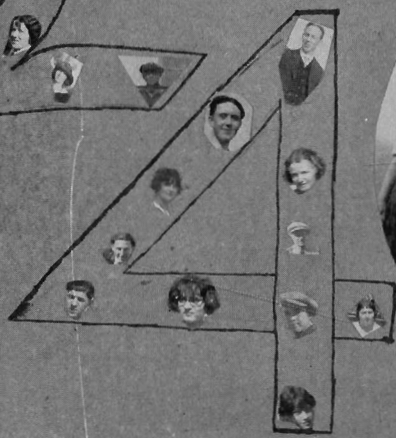

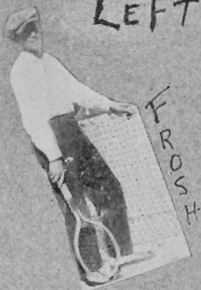

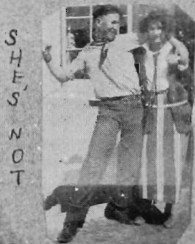
