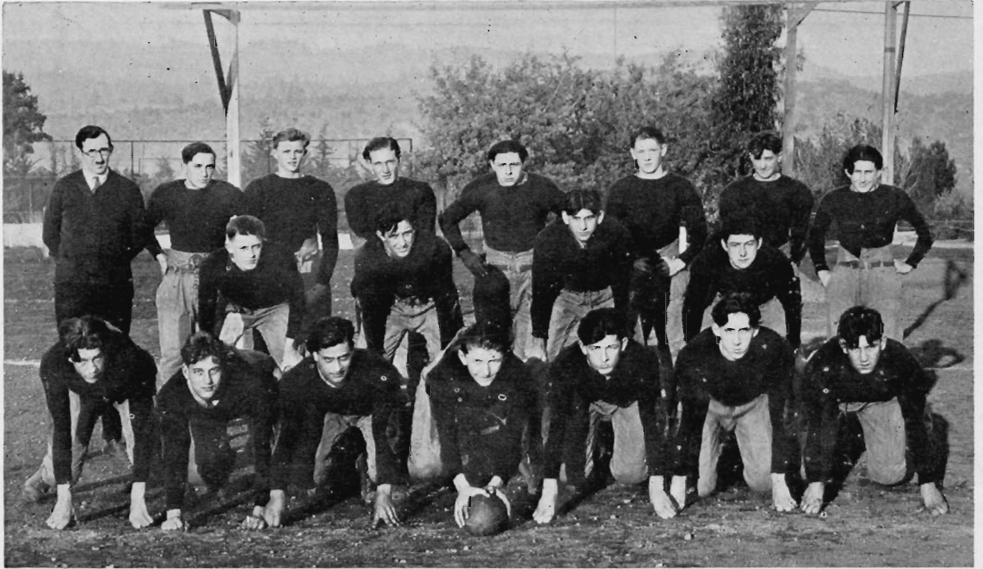

Class "B" Basketball Team



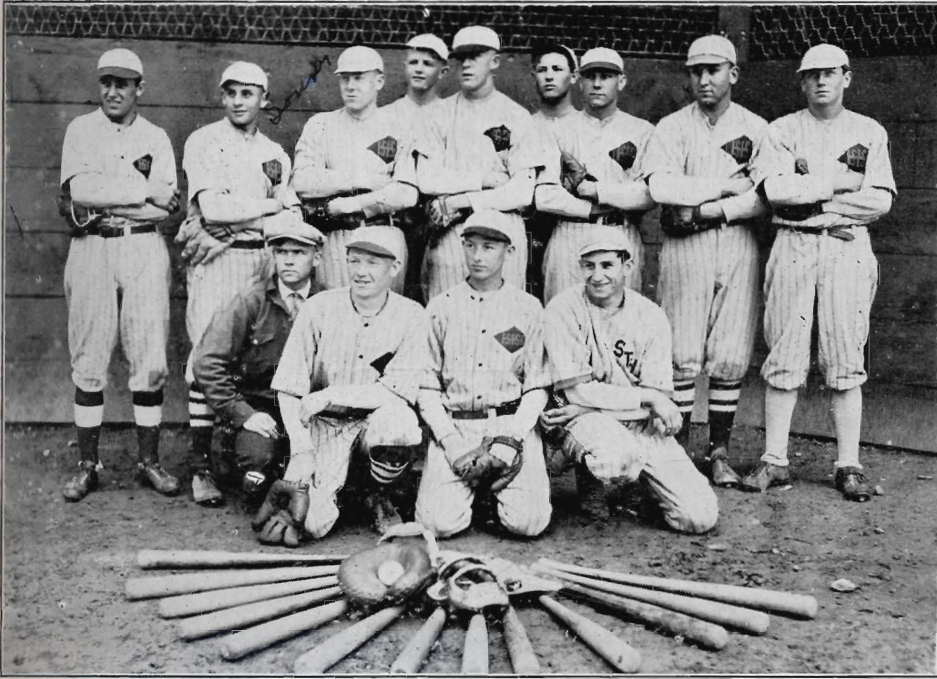

The 1925 baseball season was the most successful one St. Helena has ever had. We won the pennant for our division of the league, this being the first baseball pennant the school has ever won. As most of the players will be back next year we are looking forward to a winning team then.

When the call for baseball candidates was issued by Coach Gardiner, about twenty-five men reported. Most of the players from last year's team were among them, so we looked forward to making a good showing in our division.

Our first game was a practice game with Napa and although they won we were not discouraged as our regular pitcher and catcher did not play.

Our first league game was with Geyserville at St. Helena. St. Helena won, 14-5. Healdsburg at Healdsburg was next and we

emerged the victors by a 11-7 score. Cloverdale then forfeited to us. The next and closest game was with Calistoga which was won by St. Helena, 5-4. It was a ten inning game. We then had to defeat Sonoma to win the pennant and we did, the score being 13-2. We played Vallejo for the championship of the Central and Southern Divisions of the Northwest League of the North Coast Section of the C. I. F. Vallejo won 4-3, their pitcher being too much for us.

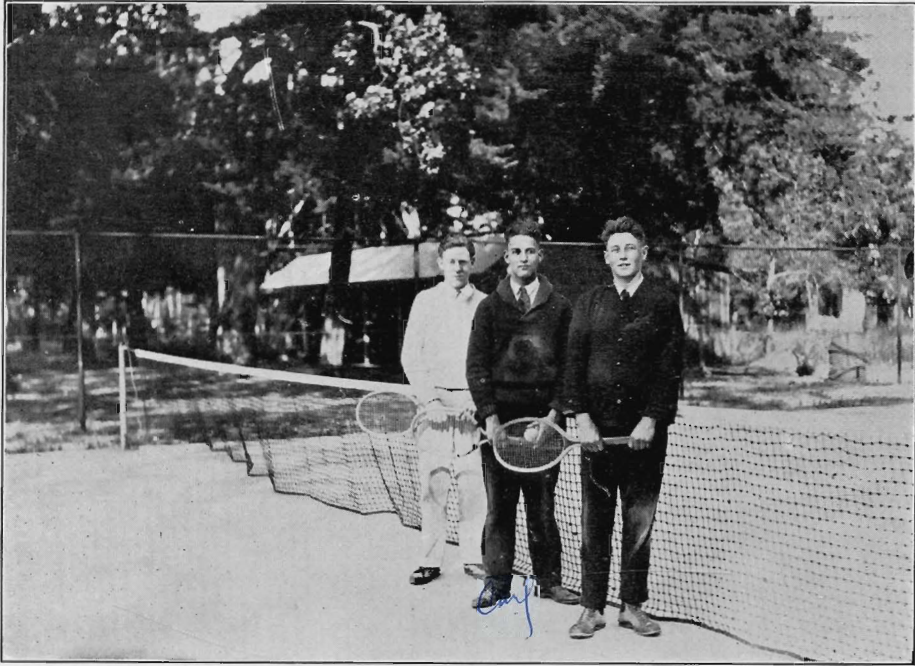
Jursch and Blake lost the doubles at Petaluma by the score of 6-4, 7-5, 14-12.
