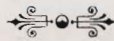

They were molded into strong fighting units under the able coaching of Mr. O'Brien. The performance of the tennis team in the winning of two pennants without losing a set speaks well for the improvement the team has made.

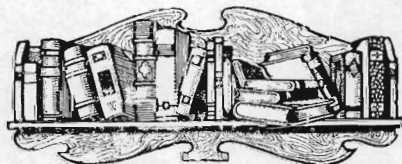
Playing through the most difficult schedule in the history of the school, the baseball team has emerged victorious with another pennant to its credit. Our track team, consisting of only three men, won four points for our school. Altogether St. Helena High hung up three pennants in major sports this year as against two for any other school in this section.

The school dramatists also have organized a club and treated the school to several plays far superior to those ordinarily presented by the students.

The Student Body, Boys' Club, and A. G. S. have carried on a drive against carelessness in dress, habit, dishonesty, and cheating: just another step in the program of advancement.

That studies were not neglected was shown by the point system, the average being much higher than heretofore. The Senior class led the school with an average of 106.

The short year of 1925-1926 has been an era of improvement and advancement in every activity engaged in by the Student Body.

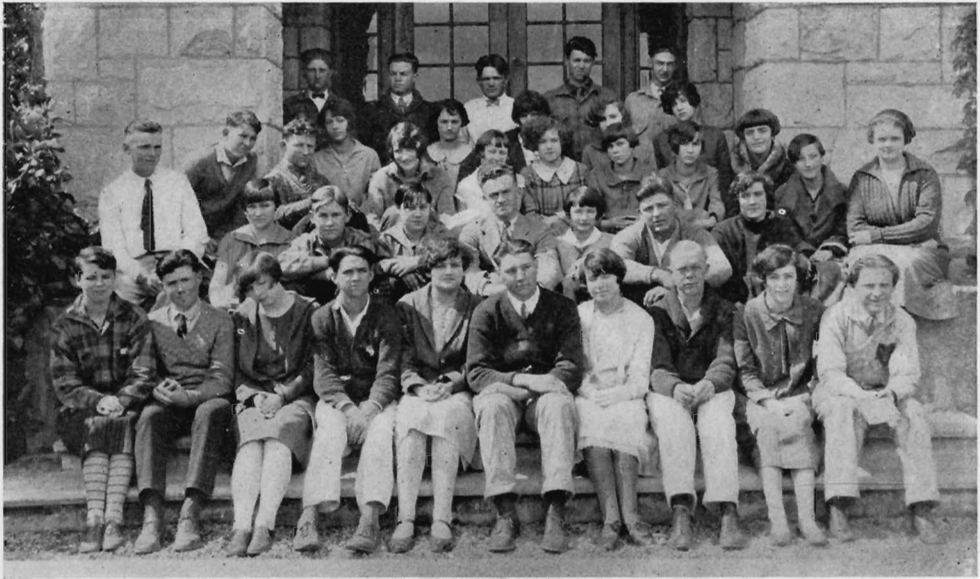
