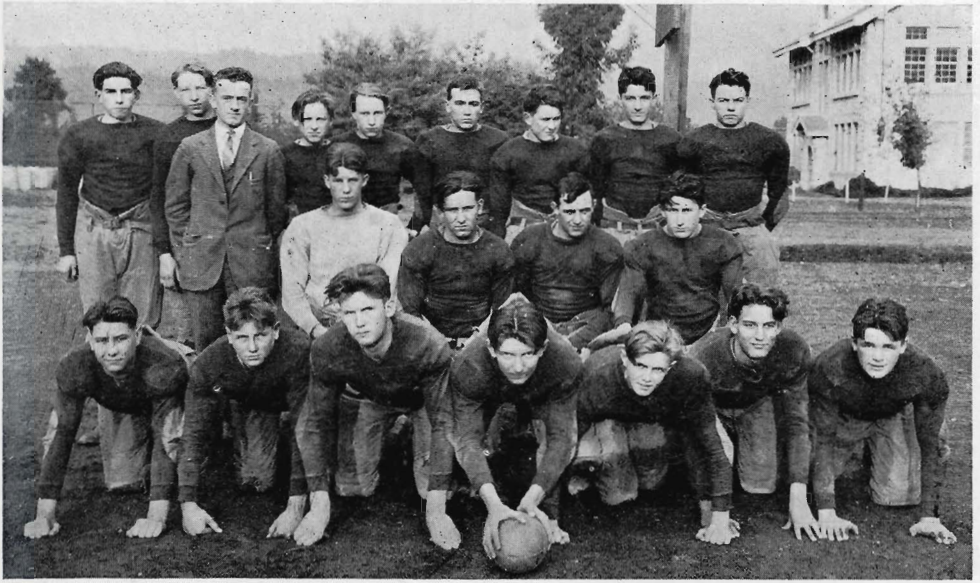

With a new coach, several veterans and a number of candidates for the vacant positions, the prospect for our second football season was good.

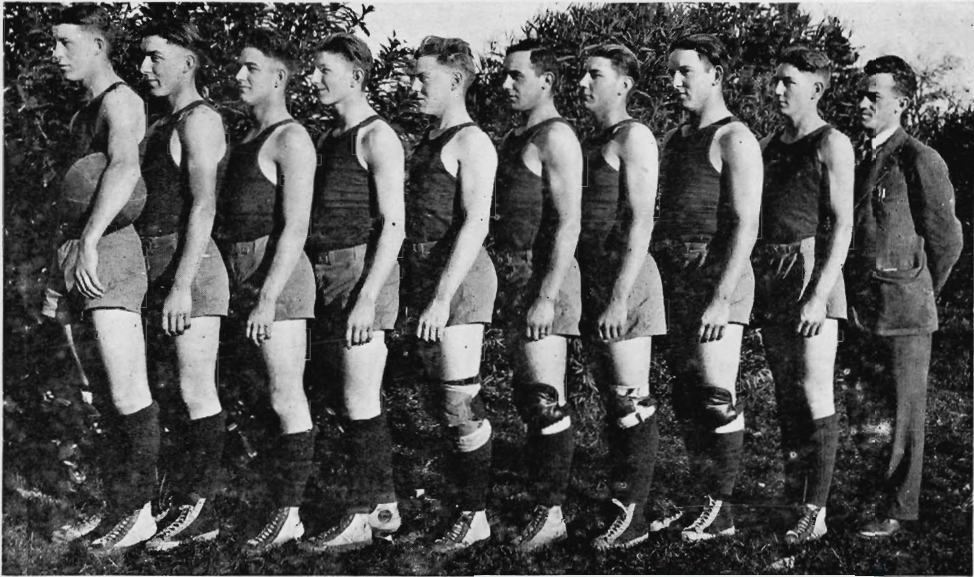
The scores do not show the strength of the team, as we were playing in a league with some of the most powerful teams in the state.

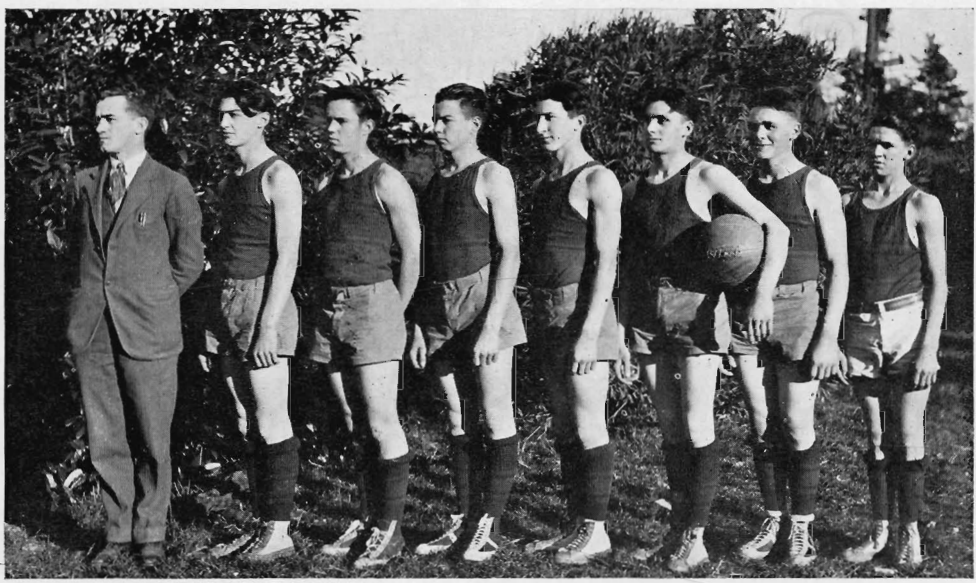

The baseball season was extremely satisfactory. Due to the efforts of Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Gardiner the team was successful in winning the championship of this division. After losing the first league game to Vallejo, the team fought their way to the top and defeated Vallejo for the league championship.

The first game was a practice game with "Ryan's All Stars" from Vallejo. St. Helena won by the score of 13 to 4. The playing was ragged but the team showed promising ability. The following week we defeated Santa Rosa High School 6-2. In our first league game we were defeated by Vallejo by the score 10-6. The players had an off-day and were not disheartened by their defeat. They went to Sonoma the following Friday and won 5-0.

We played two practice games, one with St. Vincent High from Vallejo and one with Middletown High. We defeated St. Vincent 22-2, and lost to Middletown 3-1. The team was out for practice and so the loss was of no significance. In our next league game we won from Napa High 6-3. The following Tuesday with a second string battery, we lost to Middletown 5-3. By defeating Calistoga 7-1, we were tied for first place with Vallejo, and in the championship game, defeated them 9-6. We lost to Tamalpais High 16-7, on a poor diamond and with ground conditions which were a great disadvantage to our team. This brought to a close the 1926 baseball season.
