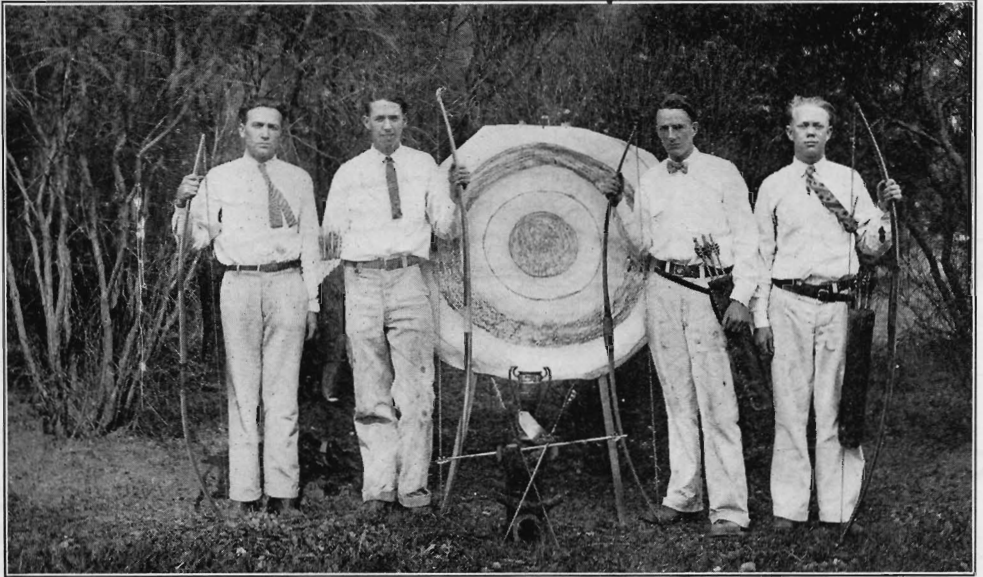


Athletics

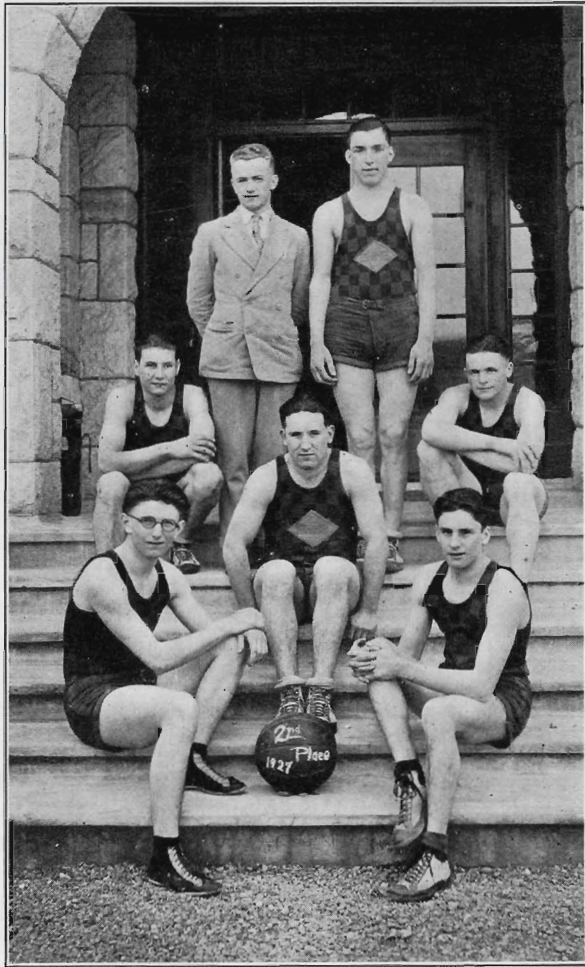

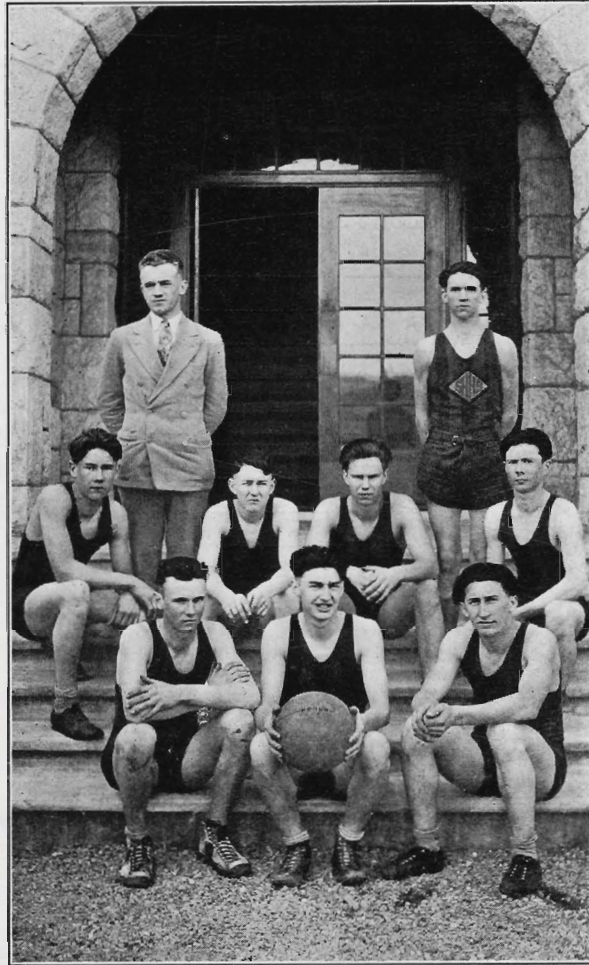
A Hike

Class "B" Basketball

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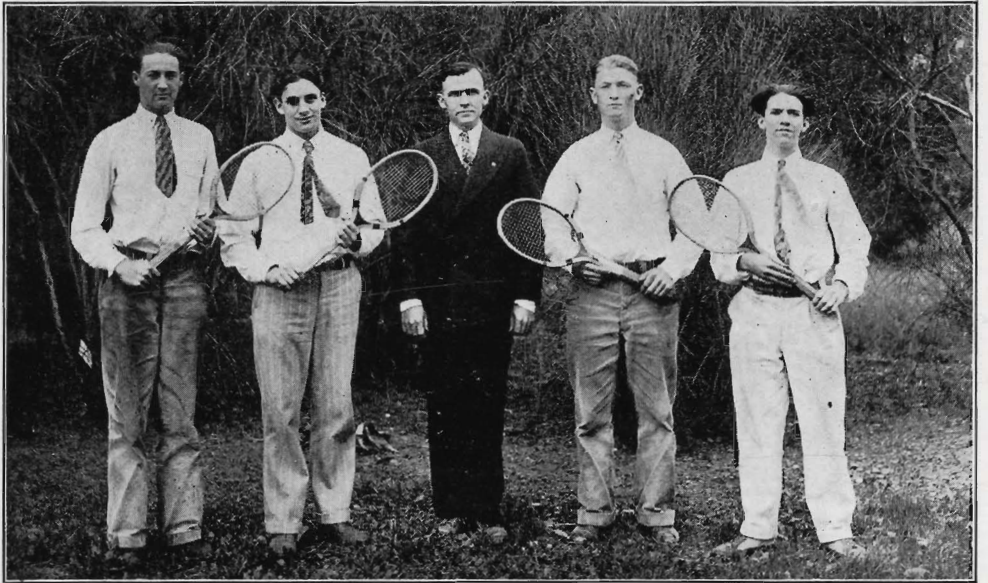

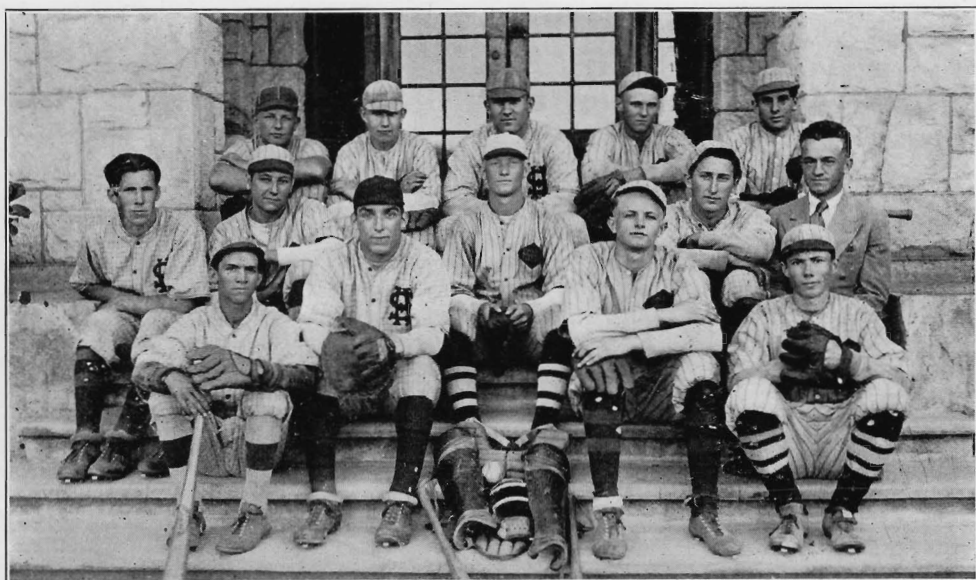
St. Helena participated in a four-school track meet which included Napa, Calistoga, Sonoma and St. Helena. The meet was a battle between Napa and St. Helena for first place, Napa finally winning. Four first places were taken by St. Helena, Vasconi taking two, and Paulson and Teping each taking one.

St. Helena sent three men to the big meet in Vallejo. Vasconi took third and fourth place in the mile and 880 respectively, while Paulson tied for third in the pole vault.

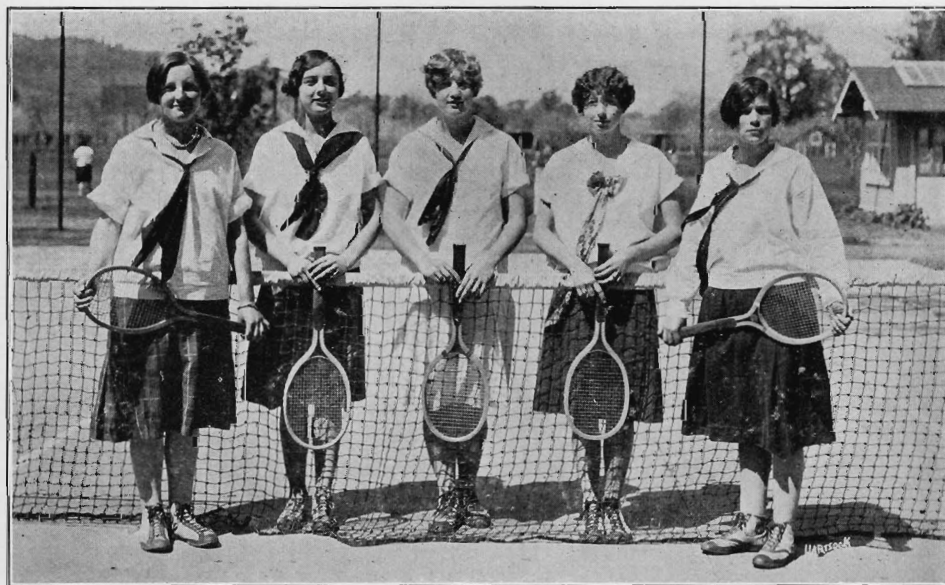
Tennis also was a very popular game this year, and a tournament was played off to pick the team.

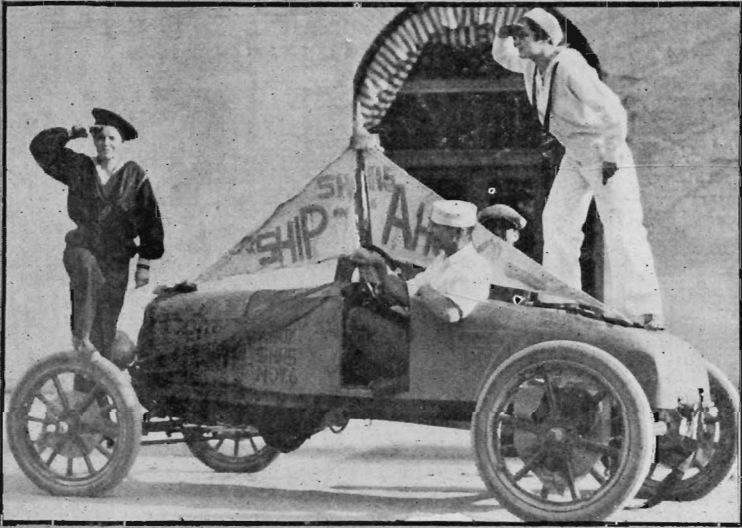

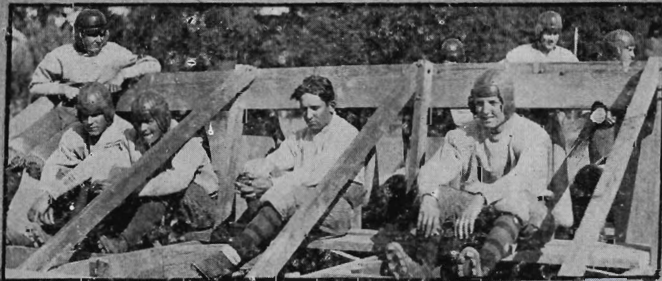
