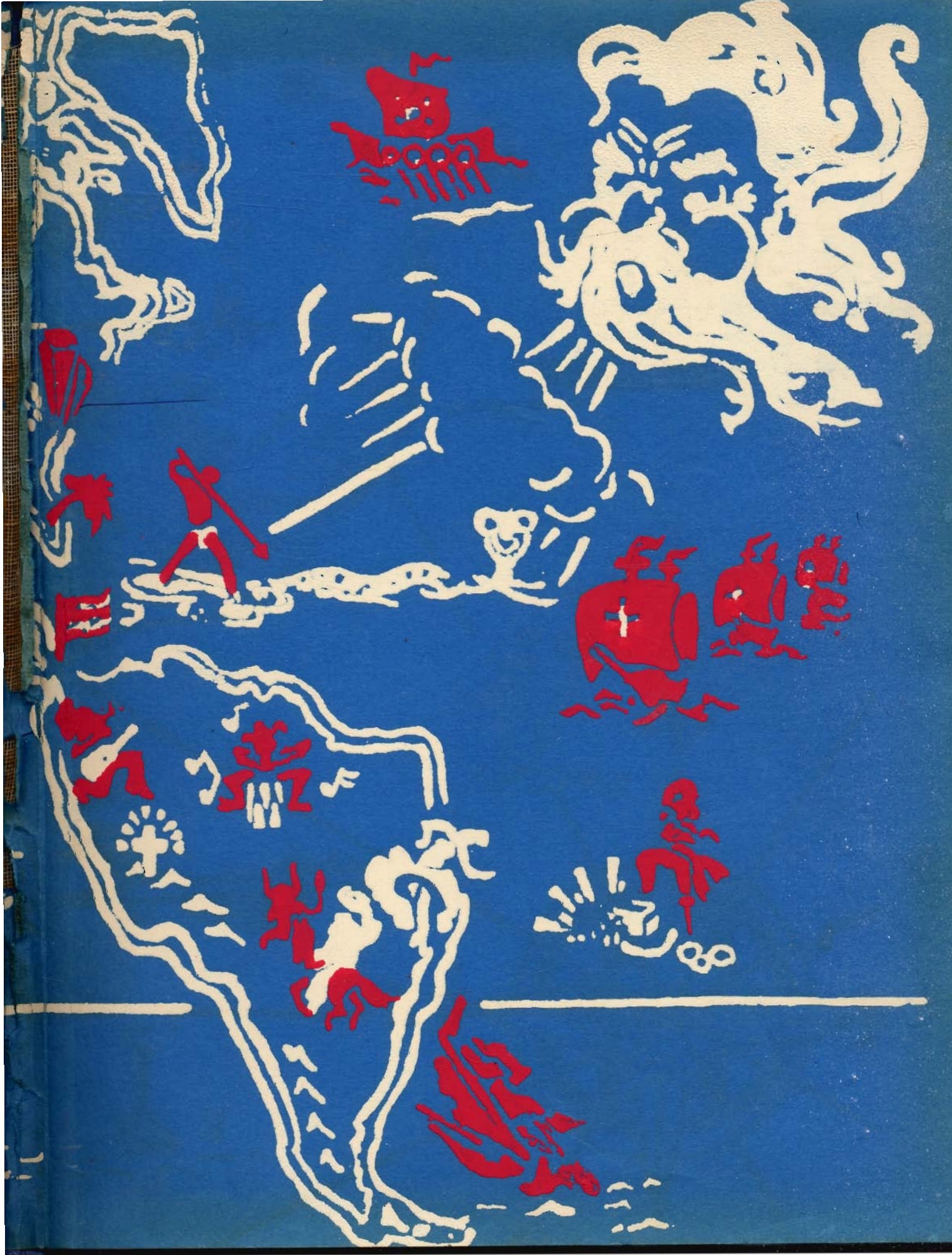

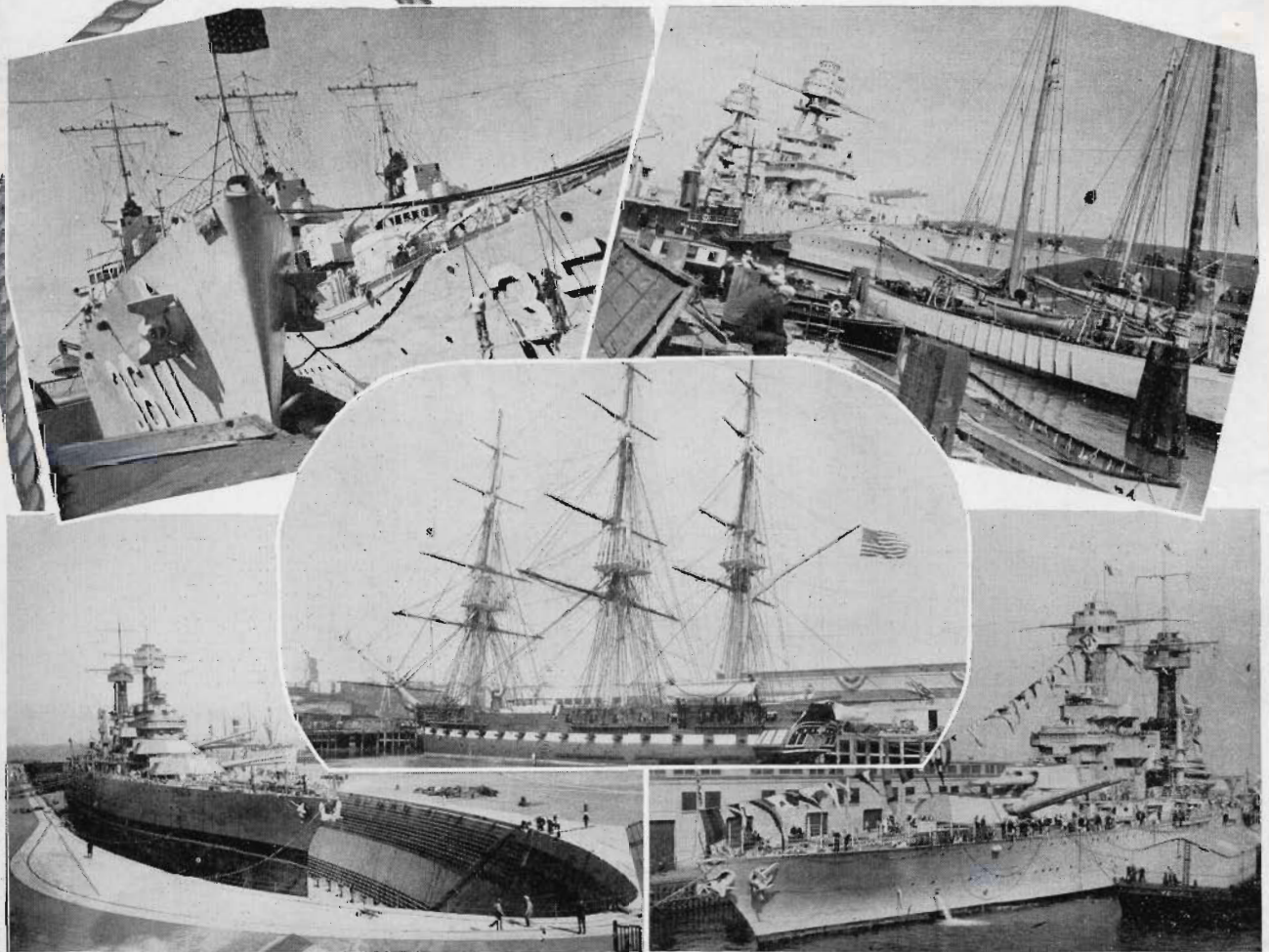

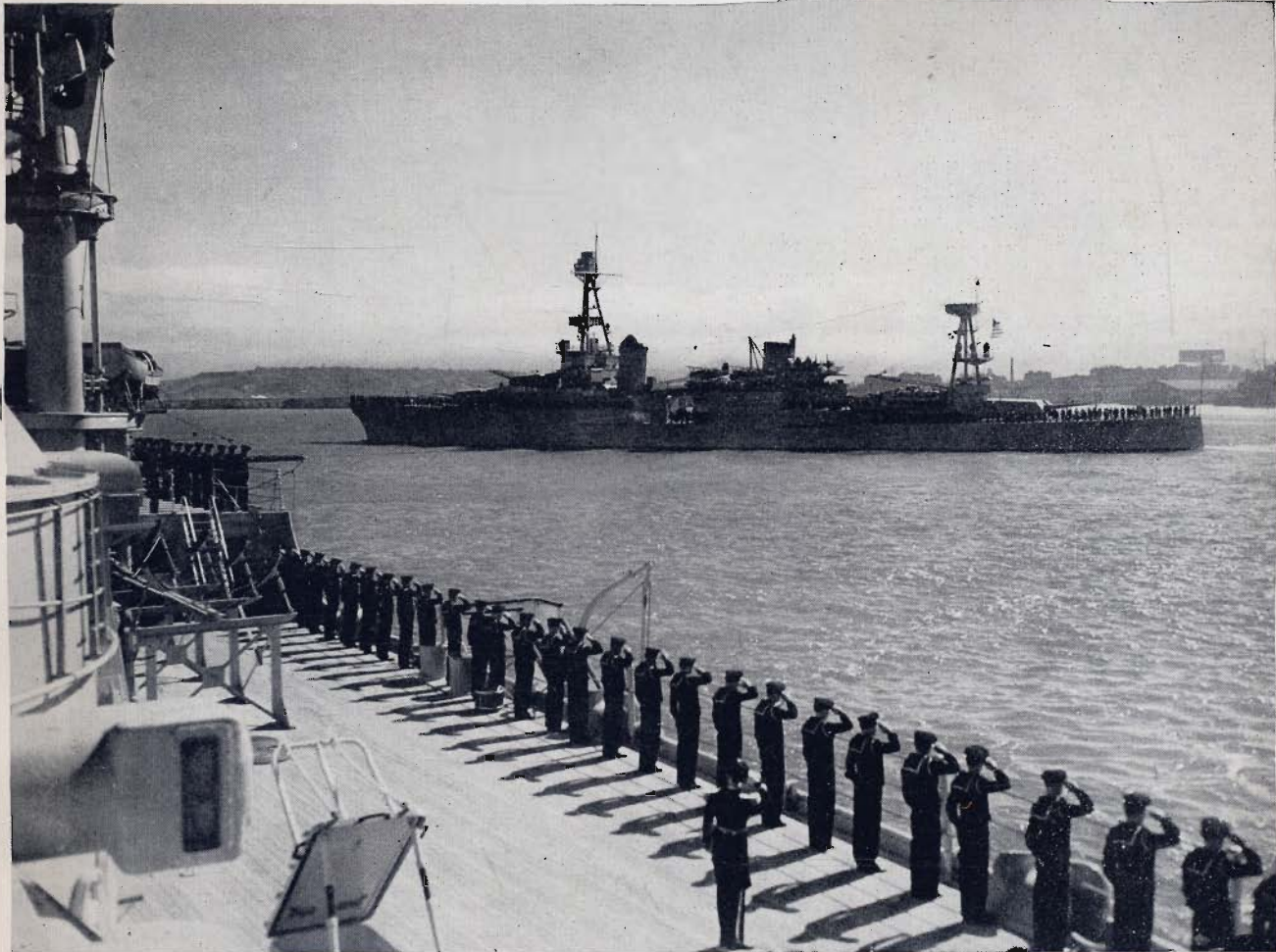
# Foreword

### SHIPS

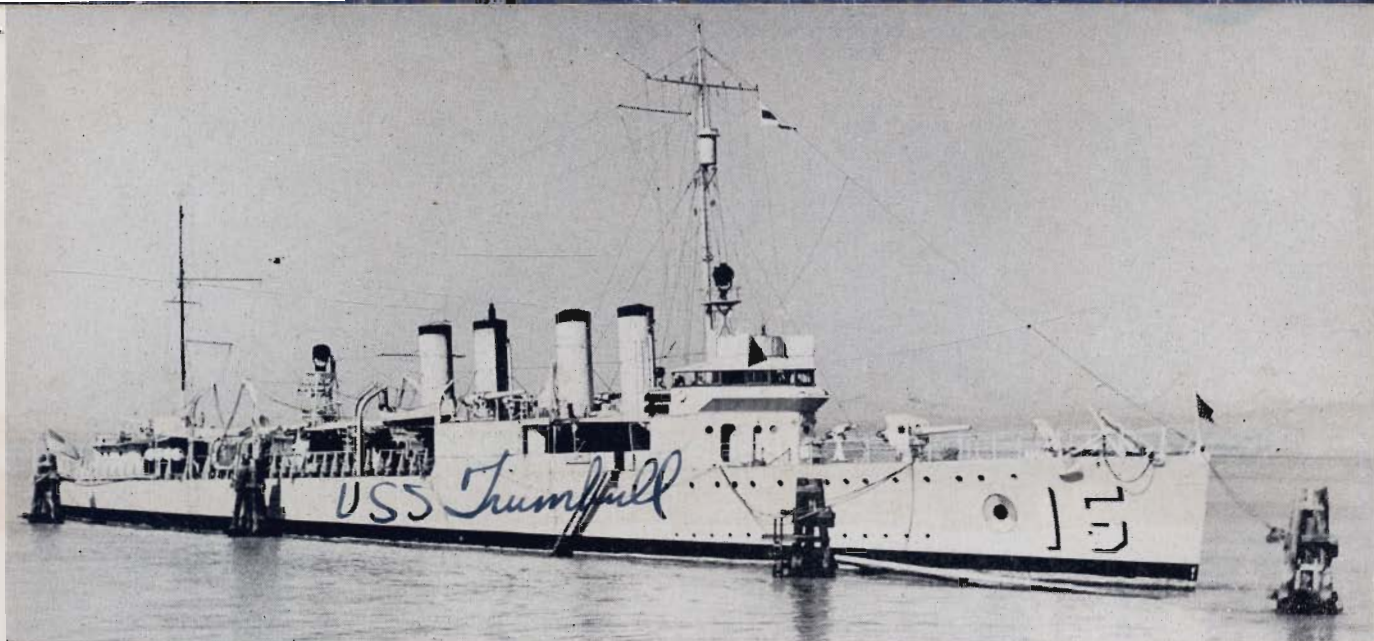
