May 2—The track boys will travel to Sacramento Stadium for the league meet. Coach Clover says we have a very good chance.

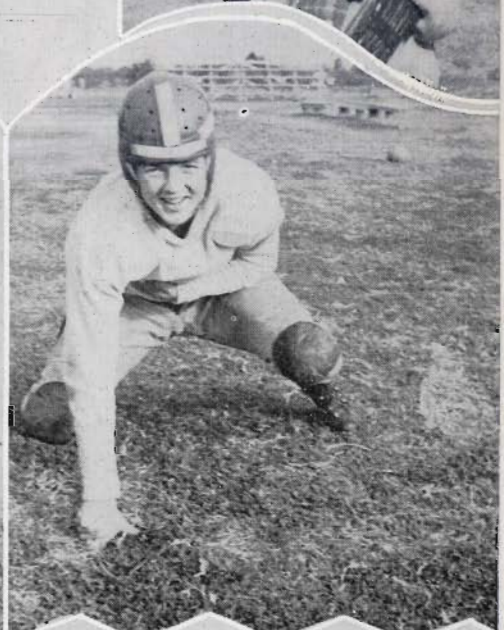
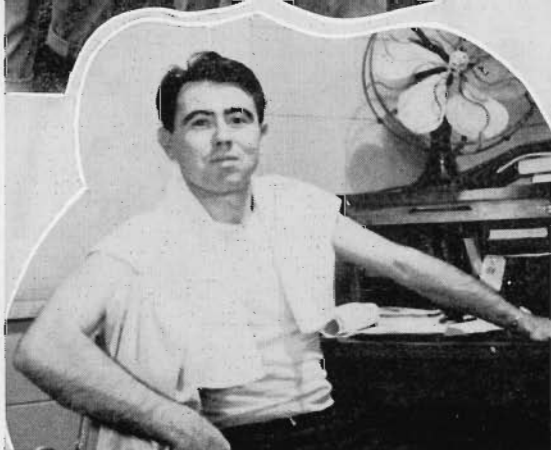
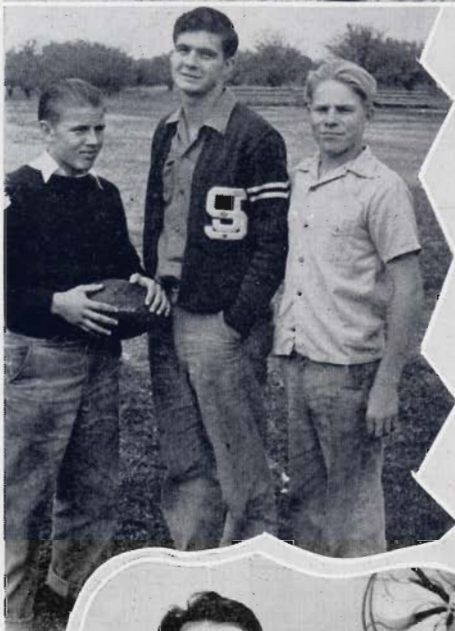
May 16—Eerie, isn't it? Seeing yourself on the screen. Everyone felt that way at the Junior-Senior Banquet.

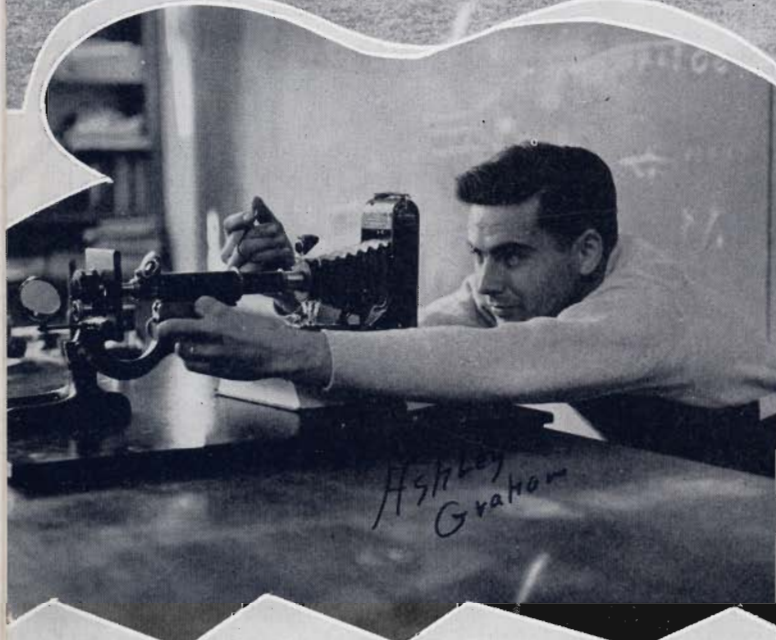
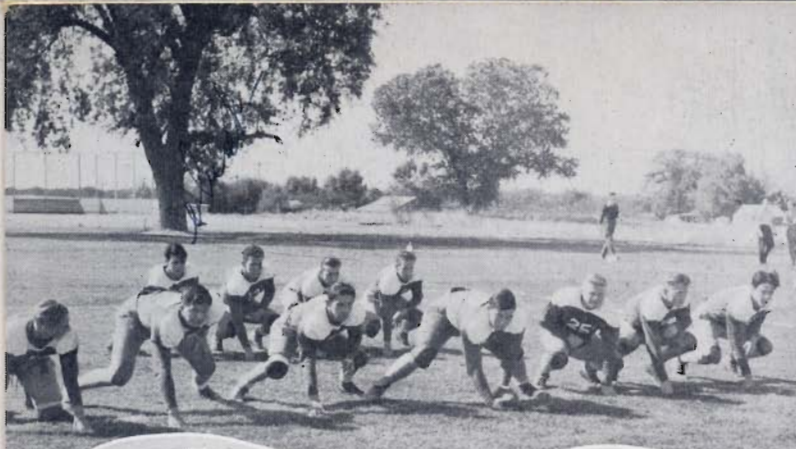
