General Information

The San Joaquin Valley District, California Federation of Women's Clubs, consisting of Fresno, Kern, Kings, Madera, Merced, Stanislaus and Tulare Counties, is one of the six districts which comprise our great California Federation of Women's Clubs, which in turn is a part of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, an international organization of women working for the betterment of humanity throughout the world.

The San Joaquin Valley District has 69 Federated clubs, total membership, 4,864.

DUES

District dues of twenty (20) cents per capita, and State dues of twenty-five (25) cents per capita, payable on or before January 2nd of each club year, shall be paid to the District Treasurer.

County dues in accordance with the By-Laws of each County shall be payable to the Treasurer of such County.

For clubs belonging to the General Federation, dues of fifteen (15) cents per capita shall be payable to the General Federation Treasurer.

PUBLICATIONS

The *California Federation News* is our official state magazine. Subscribe through your District Chairman of Federation News or direct to the office at Placentia, California.

Single subscriptions are 50 cents per year, or a 25-cent rate for 100% club subscription. Clubs of 250 or more membership, subscribing in blocks of 50, may receive the magazine at a 35-cent rate.

San Joaquin Valley District has the largest percentage of clubs subscribing 100%. Refer to the back of the Year Book for list of clubs listed as 100% subscribers.

The Clubwoman, official magazine of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, is \$1.00 per year, or 65 cents in groups of ten or more subscriptions. Subscribe direct to General Federation Headquarters, 1734 N Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., or to State Headquarters, 1031 South Broadway, Los Angeles, California.

FOUNDATION FUND

This fund was begun in 1929 for the furtherance of Federation work. Each club member has been asked to give \$2.50 toward this fund, although it is not a compulsory obligation. One-half of this fund goes to the General Federation and one-half stays in the state. In California, the interest from this fund is added to the Endowment Fund interest to send speakers to the clubs.

San Joaquin Valley District has the largest percentage of clubs paid in full. Our goal is a 100% district.

Refer to the back of the Year Book for list of clubs paid up in full on this fund.

GENERAL FEDERATION MEMBERSHIP

A club desiring to attain Universal Membership by becoming a member of the General Federation as well as the County, District and State Federation, should write to Mrs. Harold P. Dyer for application blanks.

These blanks must be filled out in their entirety and mailed to Mrs. John Stearns Thayer, 1818 West 25th St., Los Angeles, Calif., Director for California, for her signature. Her office sends the application to General Federation Headquarters in Washington, D. C. A copy of the club's By-Laws and a check for one year's dues must accompany the application blanks, the check to be made out to the

General Federation of Women's Clubs. Dues are fifteen (15) cents per capita. If a club's membership is less than 15, the minimum is \$2.50. Should a club drop the membership for a time and wish to be reinstated, the renewal fee is \$3.00.

As a matter of courtesy, the club voting to join the General Federation should notify the District Chairman of Federation Extension, who in turn notifies her State Chairman.

RULES FOR AWARDS OF MERIT FOR CIVIC ACHIEVEMENT

- (a) To the club contributing the achievement of greatest permanent value to the community;
- (b) Project to be considered must be started and completed during the year in which the award is claimed;
- (c) Award to be decided by a committee of three, to be appointed by the District President;
- (d) Project shall be judged on a percentage basis as follows: 50% for permanency of project; 25% for accomplishment without aid of other organizations; 25% for originality of subjects of project.

PENNY ART AWARD

The purpose of this Fund is the promotion of American art.

The contribution is one penny for each member for the year. The money collected is sent to the District Treasurer, the check or money order being marked "Penny Art Fund." The District Treasurer must remit to the State Art Chairman not later than March 15th of each year.

Awards of the works of California artists are presented at the Annual Convention to the clubs showing the greatest activity in furthering art.

Clubs are placed in four divisions:

Division 1—10 to 75 members

Division 2—76 to 199 members.

Division 3—200 to 399 members

Division 4—400 members and over.

An Art Report must be sent by the Art Chairman or Club Secretary to the State Art Chairman not later than March 15th of each year.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS San Joaquin Valley District Federation

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be San Joaquin Valley District California Federation of Women's Clubs.

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this District Federation shall be to promote the interests and unite the influence and enterprise of the Federated Women's Clubs of this District; to promote educational, moral, social and civic measures and to compare methods of study and work.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. (a) This District Federation shall be composed of the Federated Clubs, located within the San Joaquin Valley District as outlined by the California Federation of Women's Clubs.

(b) To be eligible to membership in this District Federation, a club shall have been organized at least three months, and have a membership of not less than ten. It shall show by its Constitution and By-Laws that it is non-partisan and that it does not conflict with the By-Laws of the District or State Federation.

(c) Similar clubs of men and women are eligible under the same conditions as a woman's club, provided representation shall be by women. The dues and representation shall be upon the basis of women membership.

(d) Clubs holding membership in this District Federation automatically become members of the County and State Federations.

Section 2. (a) A club desiring to join this District Federation, shall make application, accompanied by a copy of its Constitution and By-Laws with name and address of its President and Corresponding Secretary to the District Chairman of Federation Extension, who after investigation, shall present the application to the District Executive Board. Upon approval by the said Board, the
