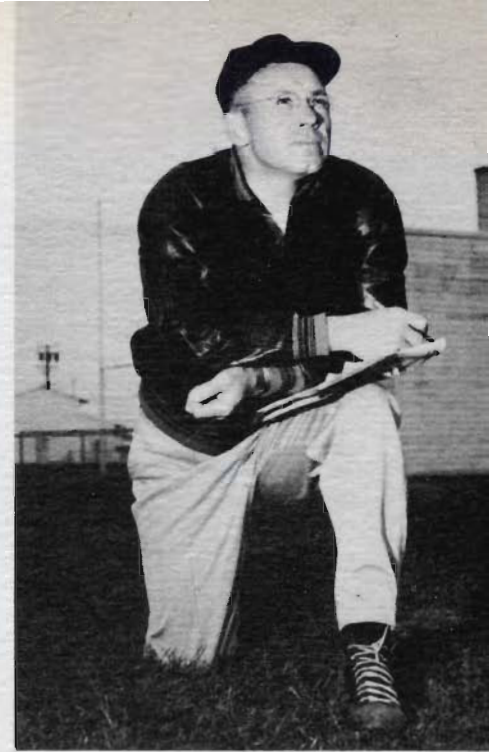


Colt Baseball

Coach Gene Stagnaro's Colt baseballers were riding in second place in the Sac-Joaquin League when the El Recuerdo went to press. The SC aggregation had compiled a record of six wins and one loss. In pre-season encounters the Colts took the measure of the Oakdale Mustangs twice, 9-7 and 20-12, and won handily over Manteca by a score of 13-0. Their winning ways continued into league play when they toppled Modesto, 5-4, in ten innings and Turlock, 14-2. An unexpected loss came in conference game number three when the Colts were dumped by Grant in ten innings, 1-0. Leading chuckers for the team were Wilmer Moton, Don Chambers and Ivan McAtee. In the hitting department Jack Sahargun, Wilmer Moton, Lloyd Canton and George Terezakas were all batting over .500. Other Colt standouts included Bruce Holstein, Jerry Gillespie, Ed Carver, Ray Stanley, Dave Gregson, Mathew Fish and George McCollum.

Mustang Track

After assuming the leadership of an unknown, untried band of SC Mustang thinlies a short time before the beginning of the season, Arner Gustafson, ex-Pacific distance star, did a good job as track coach. With but few experienced tracksters on hand and a tough schedule to face Gustafson's group of cinder men worked hard, and up to the half way mark in the season's competition they were able to give a good, in fact better than expected showing for the school. Spearheaded by Frank Netzer and ex-footballer Henry Welch in the sprints and Paul Goodman in the middle distances, the Tang track squad was able to salvage some points in various meets, but did not show near the polish displayed by the 1950 version of the Mustang cinder team. In the season's first outing the Tang tracksters won 40 points against their opponents', CCSF, 82 counters. In following meets Gustafson's men scored 27 points to Sacramento's 89; dropped a third outing to San Mateo, 34-88; beat both Placer and Sacramento State while losing to Sacramento JC; and could score but 15 points in a five-way meet with Hartnell, Menlo, Monterey, and the Stanford Frosh. Other performers who rate extra mention are Ron Pecchenino, Ortho Drew, and Art Wyatt in the distances, Lowell Herbert in the weights, and George Donnell in the broad jump.

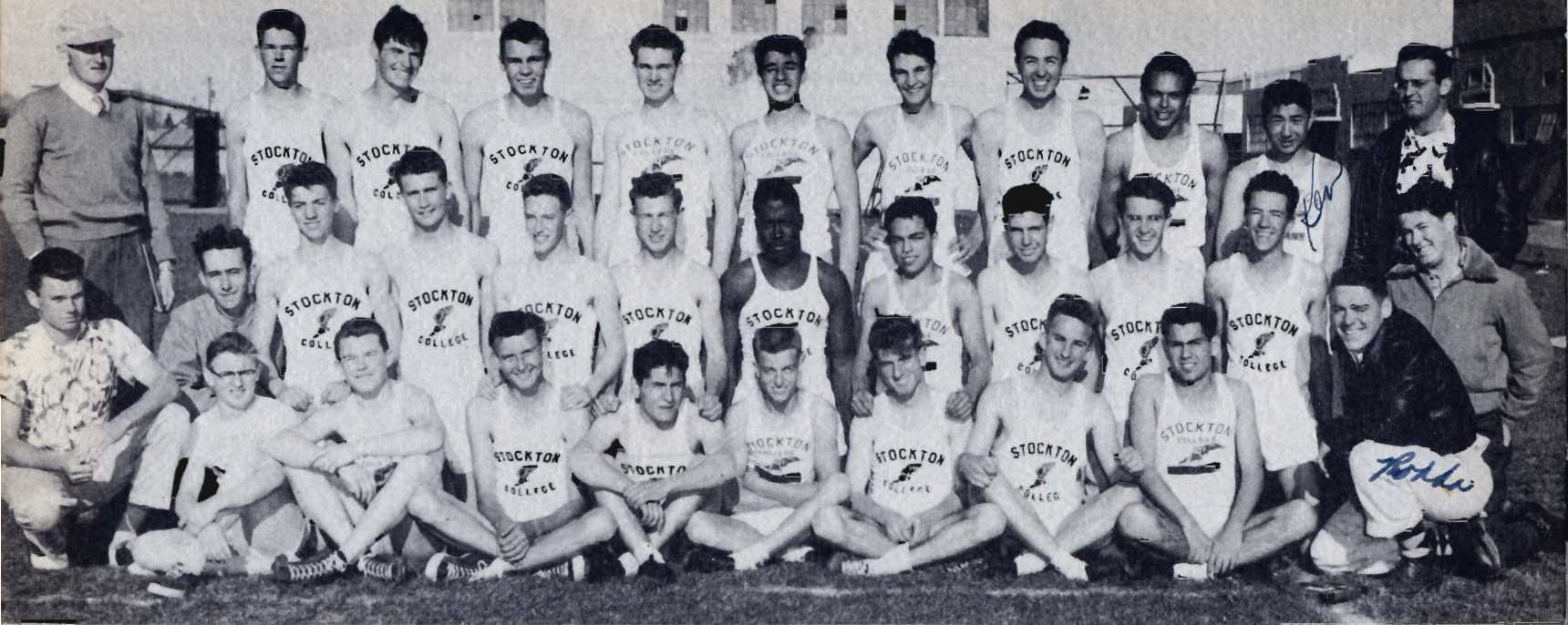

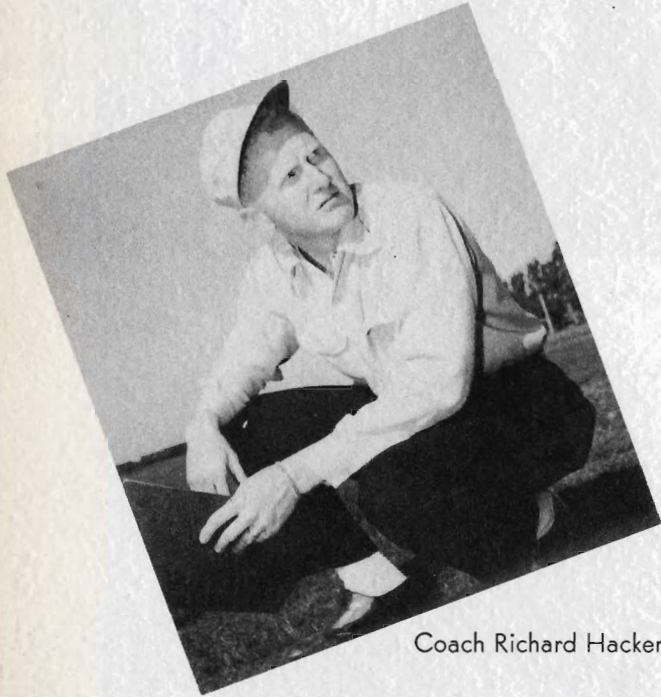

Bad weather and a resulting damp track hampered the Colt cindermen of Coach Rich Hacker during the early season. A lack of good reserve strength also handicapped the S C trackmen. Nevertheless, the Colts put up a good showing in their first meets. They met defeat at the hands of the powerful Sacramento Dragons in their initial try. The Sacramentans registered a 70-34 win over the S C thinlies. Next, a strong and powerful Modesto cinder squad overwhelmed the locals on the Panther oval. In their third outing the Colts toppled the Turlock Bulldogs for their first win of the season. One of the top veterans for Hacker's team was Noel Berry in the hurdles. Freddie Lee, Buck Ferguson, Bob Delucchi, Charles Higuera and Howard Jackson were other mainstays of the lower division track squad. Lee, the top sprinter on the team, consistently ran the century in under 10.5. He will be back to bolster next season's tracksters.

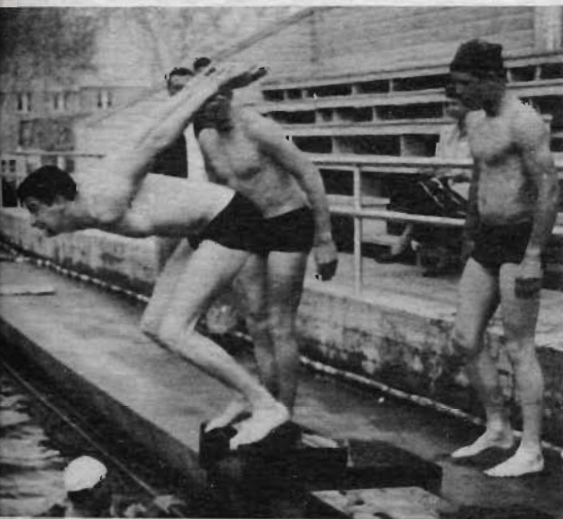

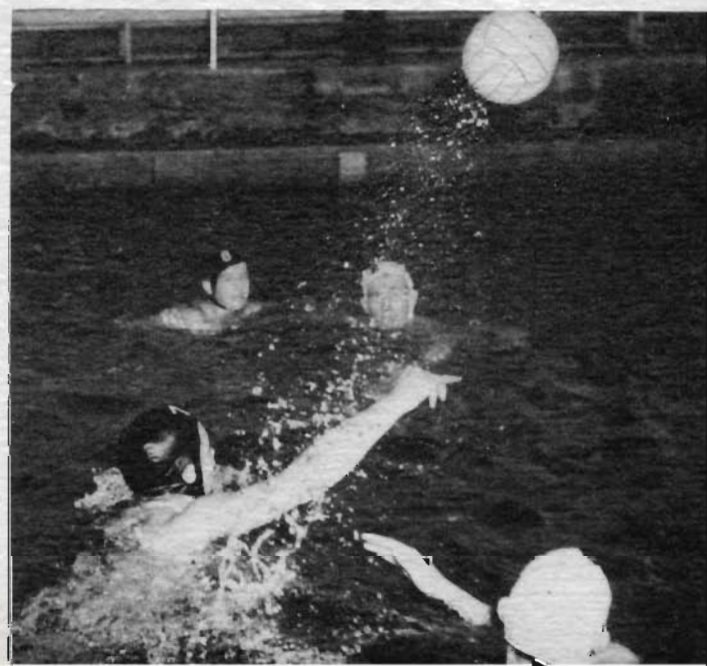

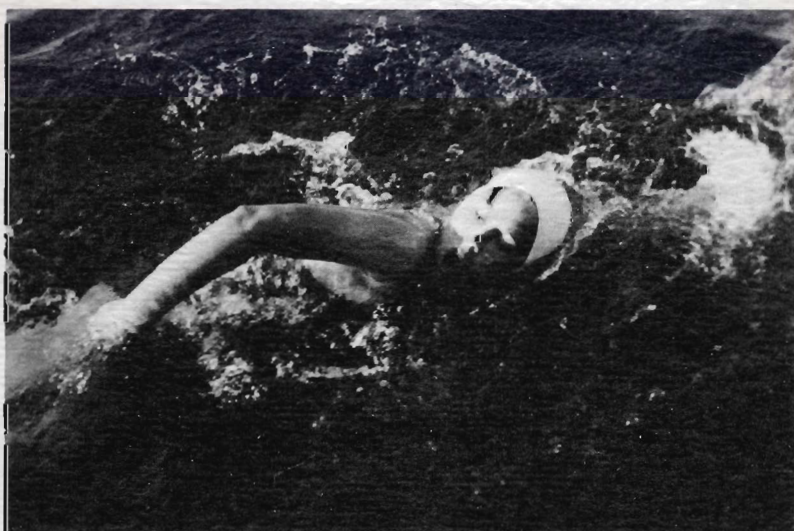
