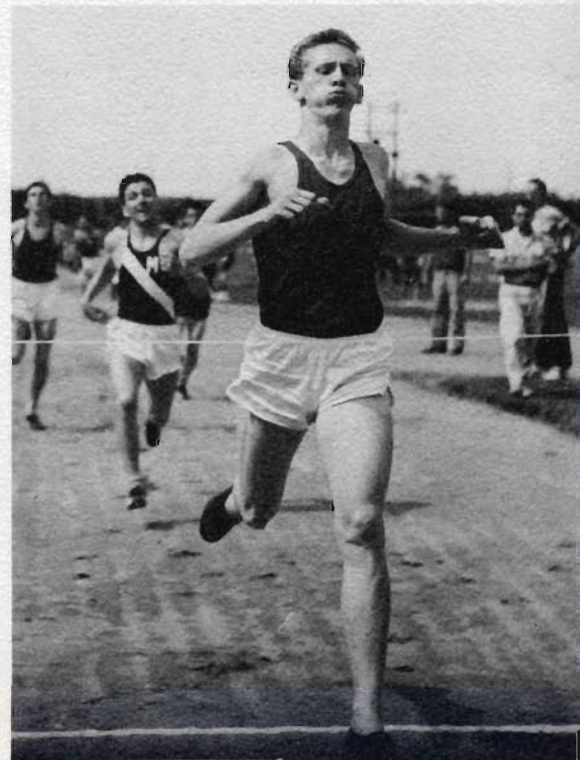

Colt Tennis

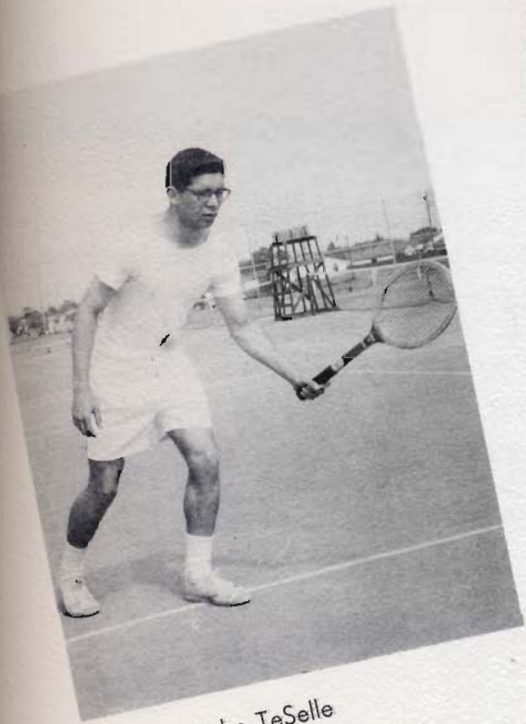

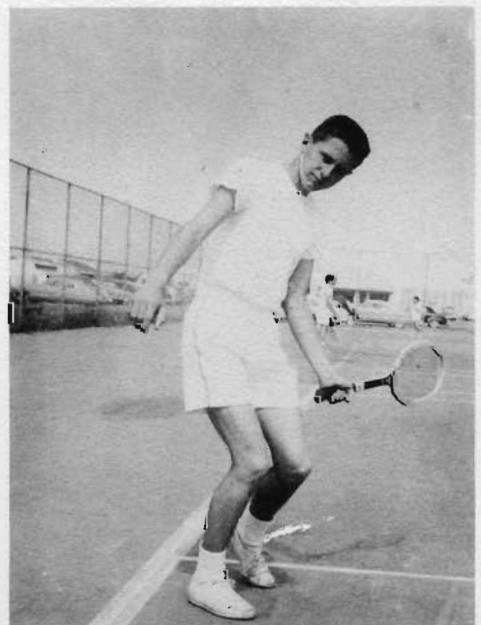
