Class Officers

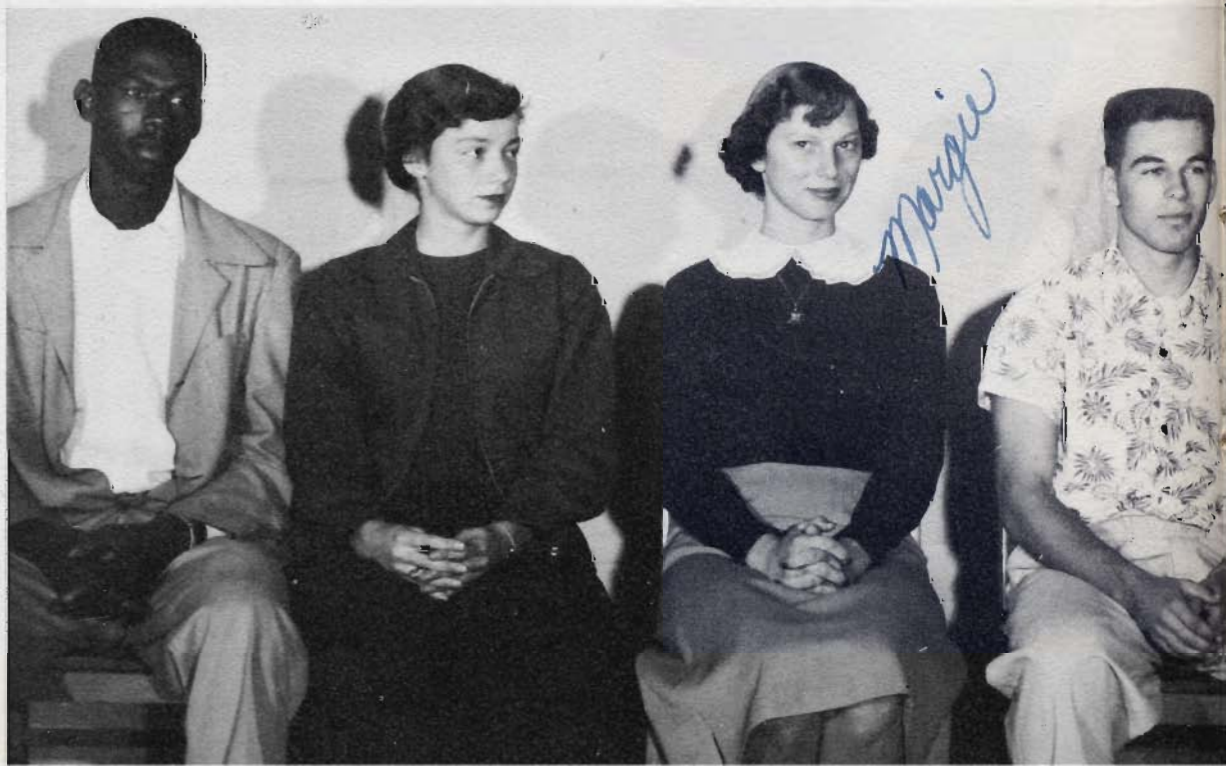

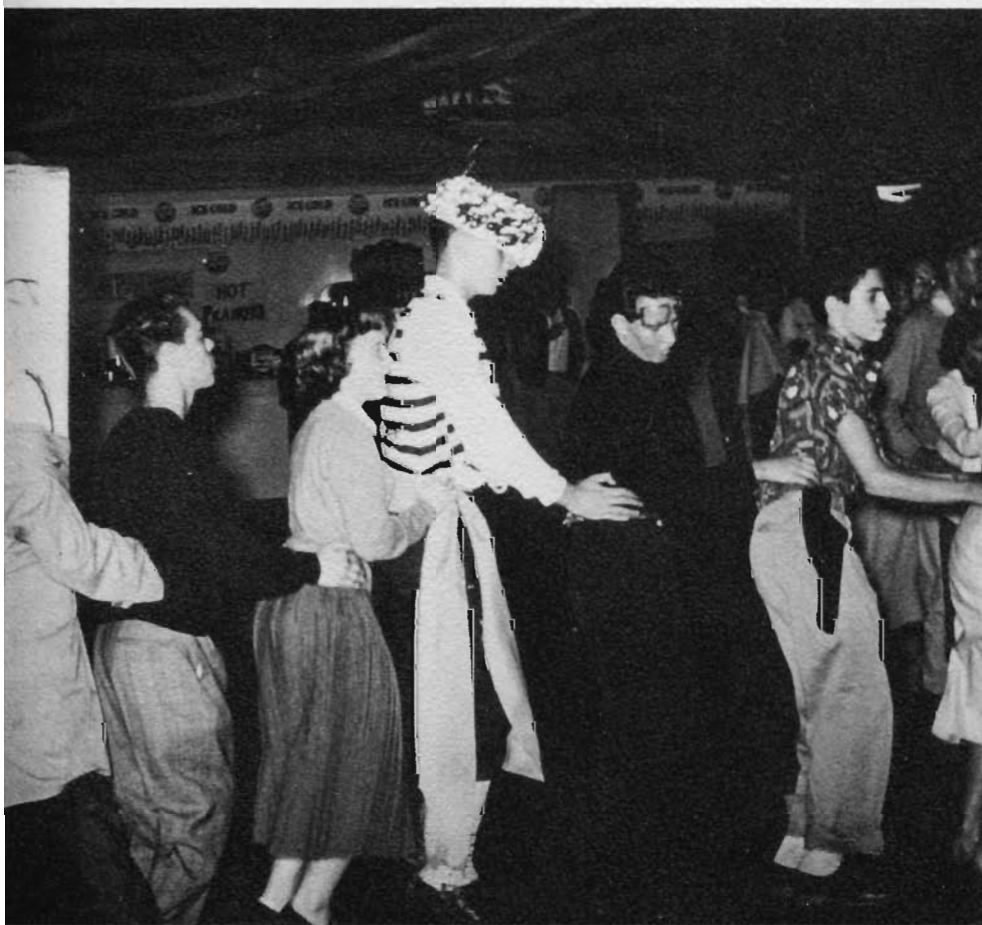

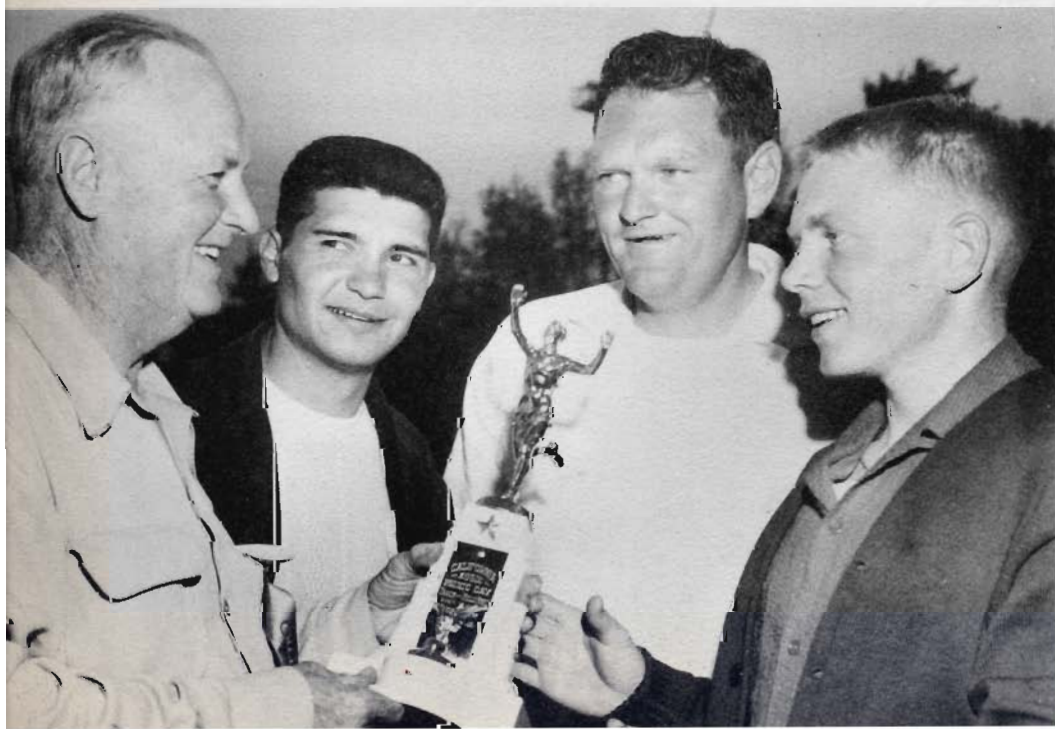

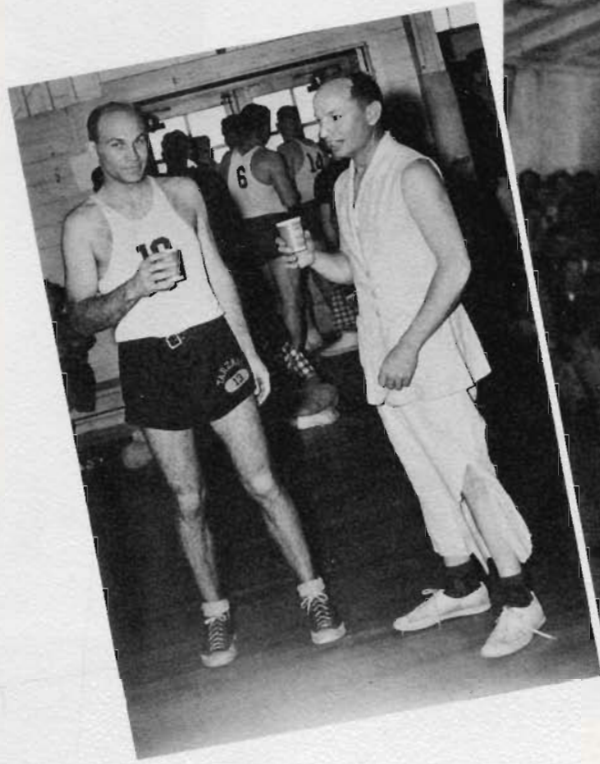
The 1952 Mustangs, Big Seven Football Champions, celebrate at their annual dinner at which time Lloyd Serpa was selected Most Valuable Player
