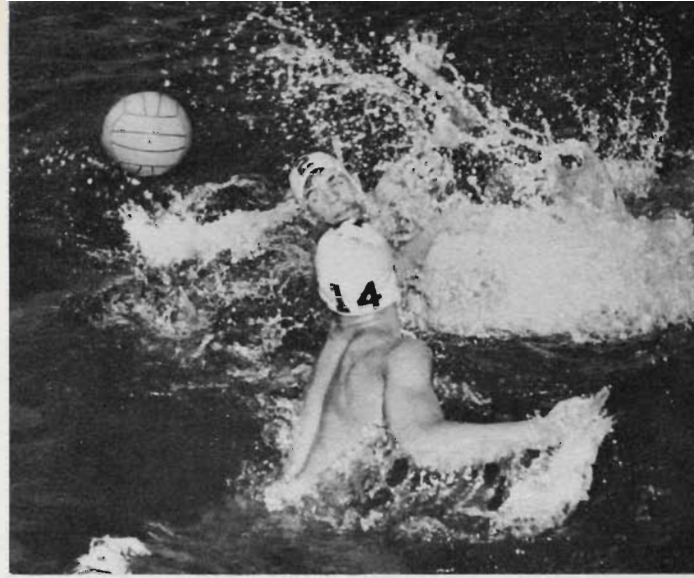

Duane was selected as one of the top five runners on the All-Star team.

In the lower division the Colts won all of their dual meets and placed seventh in the sectional. The Colts were led by Charles Curtis, Lupe Serrano, Ed Henshaw, Dick Davenport and Gene Shotwell.

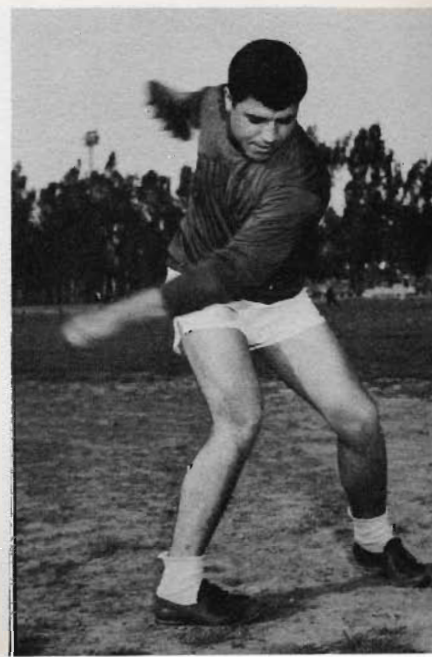

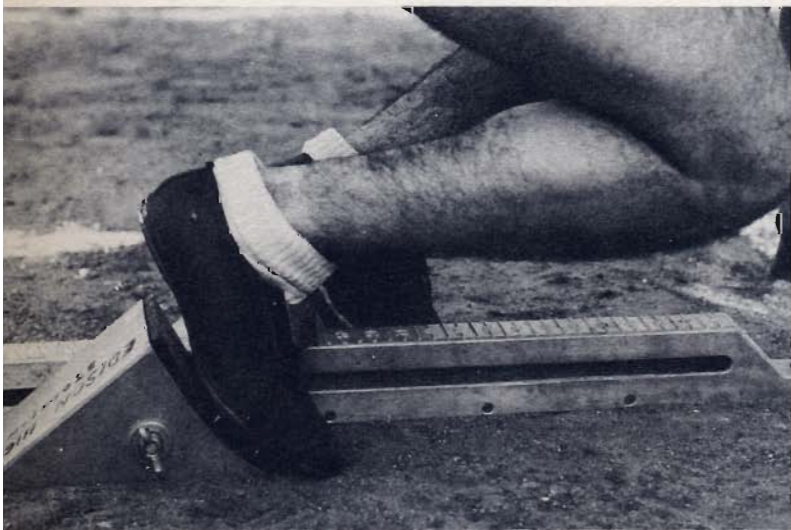

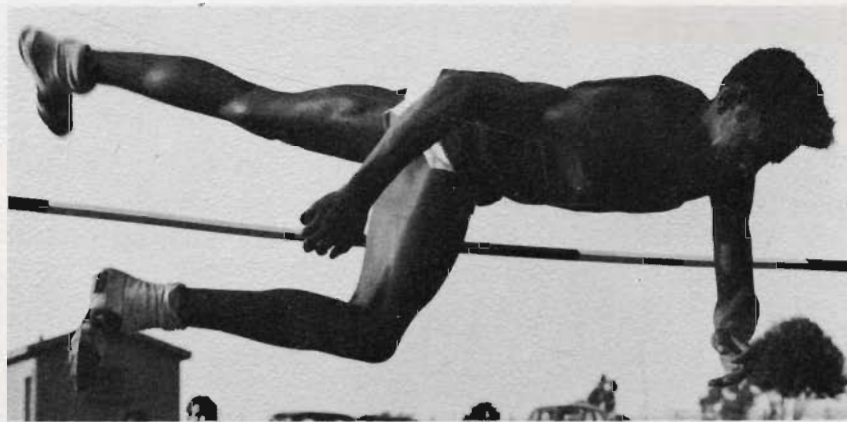
