
William Niven






Secretaries are trained --- not born. The course at Stockton College helps the students to prepare for entering the field of business.

The Collegian ...






The El Recuerdo office is known as a "home" on campus to the staff members and is a place to do homework, spend free periods, and even is shelter from a sudden downpour.


Trade and --

Body and Fender ...





Print Shop ...




This shop serves as a laboratory for students who are interested in working with machinery. Its purpose is to help students gain skill in the use of various machine tools.

The science of Chemistry, which is the science of the elements and their compounds, is taught thoroughly in the several courses of chemistry at Stockton College.


Home Economics...





Philosophy...




Students in philosophy classes study, discuss, and analyze the great ideas of the world. A study is also made of ethics and metaphysics in their aspects of philosophy.

Basic American ideals and institutions are studied in order to apply them to the understanding and analyzation of problems of the present.




Sociology...
