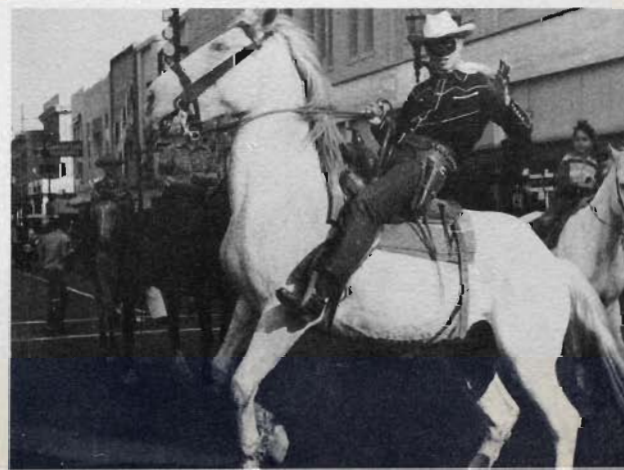

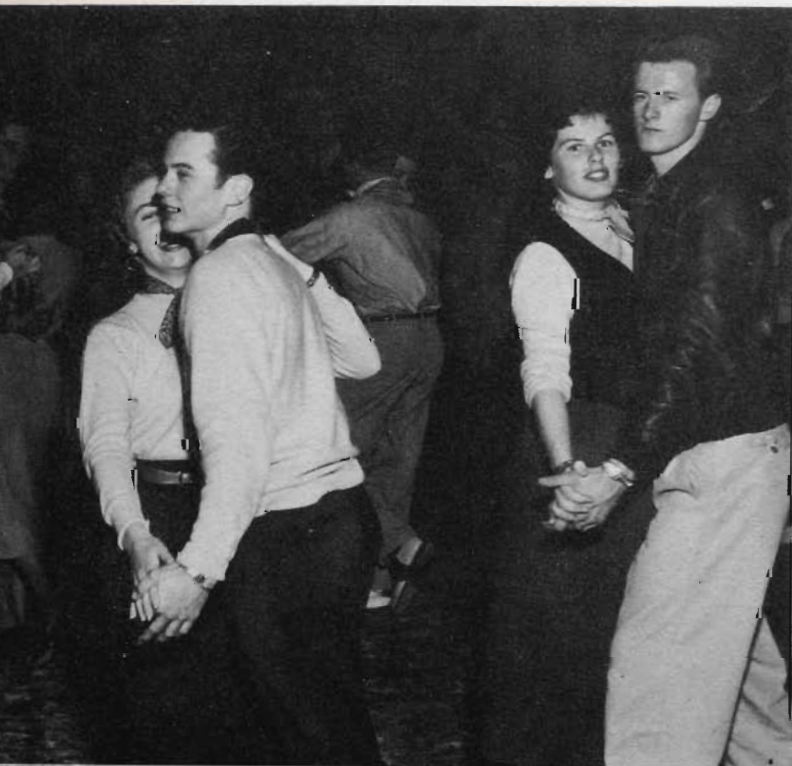

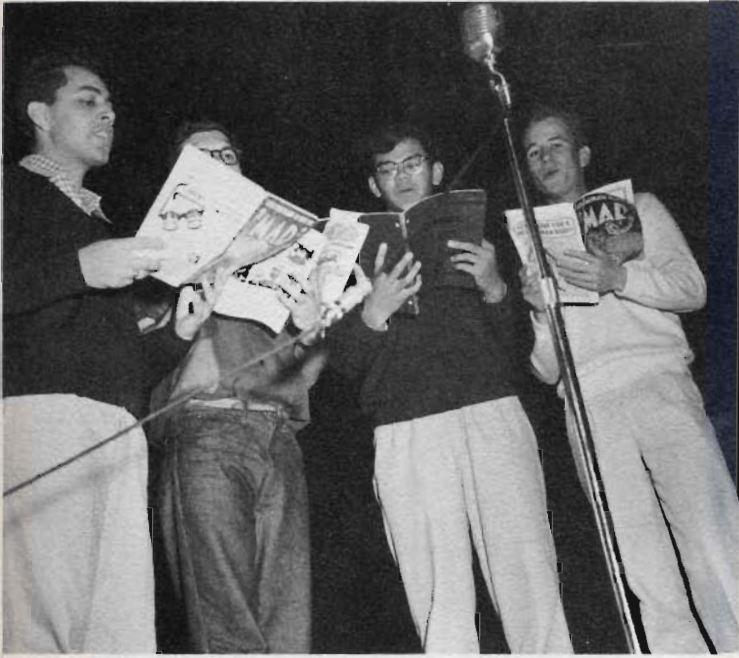
Dances

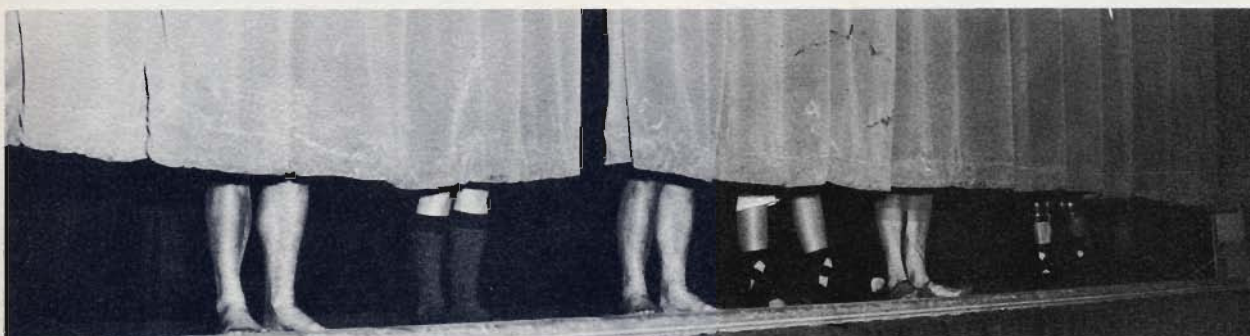

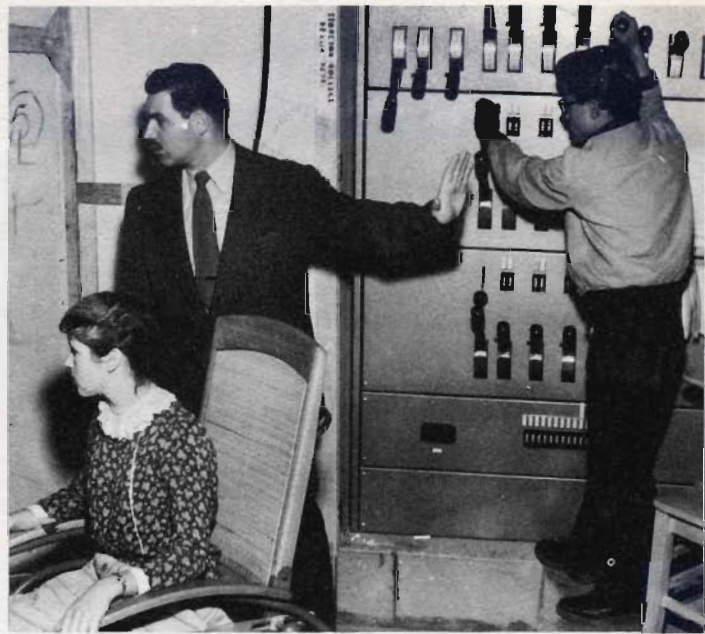
